LIBERAL LEADER WON'T SURRENDER

General Sandino Tells Marines he Wants "Free Country or Death"

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 16 (AP)—General Sandino, former liberal who has been occupying American lines at San Fernando, has informed Major G. D. Hatfield commanding a detachment of United States marines at El Occotal, he will not surrender.

"Your communication has been received and understood," General Sandino said, in reply to the demand for his surrender. "I will not surrender and will await you here. I have no fear, and rely on the bravery and patriotism of my followers."

The marine detachment was reported to be proceeding toward General Sandino's headquarters with a detachment of Nicaraguan soldiers.

SMITH FLIGHT IS STORY OF DIFFICULTIES

(Continued from Page 1) came about 5:15 p. m. Honolulu time (Honolulu time is 2 1/2 hours behind Pacific time).

At that moment they sent out their first S. O. S. after having concluded they had only enough gasoline to stay in the air another hour. They presumably were about 100 miles from Honolulu and 500 miles from the nearest land.

"We are going to land in the sea. We have a rubber lifeboat, but send help," several ships reported them as saying.

Steamers Go to Aid Three steamers, the liner Wilhelmina, the cargo transport Kenowia, and the steamer President Pierce immediately turned their courses almost immediately and rushed to their aid. The Wilhelmina appearing to be the nearest of them—apparently about 200 miles away.

Less than 30 minutes later they sent out a new call for help, stating their gasoline supply sufficient to last them four hours.

The plea for assistance was continued.

Soon the Wilhelmina wirelessed that the plane had settled to the water and that the ship supposedly was about 20 miles from it.

Radio stations were alerted in the hope that further word would come from the monoplane's radio. None came. Visions of possible disaster forced the ships toward the spot at full speed. Then there was a long silence.

A Glorious End The little monoplane City of Oakland, which had been petted and groomed for weeks in anticipation of her overseas flight, this came to a glorious end after battling the elements in a sustained flight of 25 hours and 26 minutes, during which she traveled about 2240 miles. GRANTS PASS, July 15 (AP)—A quartet of robbers, including three young men and a girl, are in the county jail here today, charged with robbing the general store at Murphy, seven miles south of here, last night. All gave their homes as Medford. Little loot was secured.

Two of the suspects, P. B. Barrow, 25, and Gladys Reymon, 18, were taken into custody last night by Murphy residents. They were seated in a car near the store, Vernon Martinson, 24, was picked up at daylight by the sheriff on his way to Grants Pass. P. Cook, 23, was taken by a deputy this morning.

He had trekked over the nine miles of mountains to the Pacific highway. As the deputy approached he asked for a pair of overalls to replace the trousers which had been torn to shreds in his hurried flight over the brush covered hills. Cook asked for a ride to Medford but was brought to jail instead.

Flashlights, shoes, chairs, \$2 in pennies and a few other articles were taken but were all recovered. Three shots were fired at one of the men last night by a Murphy resident.

Within the glass sphere was a "know-nothing" only tube, an extremely sensitive electrical device. Through the relay tube, the waves of Gary's hand, amplified electric impulses which were transmitted by telegraph line and radio to Hunstville. There the delicate "look-oo" theory switch and started a 4000-horsepower, 700-volt motor. This motor, in turn, set huge rolling mills machinery at the steel plant in motion.
