## Second of Union Services To Be Sunday Evening

## St. Peter's Episcopal Church Will Honor Pioneers, Commemorating 63rd Anniversary.

This week's union church service on the north side of the city will be held in the First Methodist Episcopal church, with the Rev. Carl H. Aves, pastor of the English Lutheran church, as speaker. His program subject will be "How Can I Save the World?"

The service on the north side of the city will be held in the Methodist church south, and the Rev. Oliver Riley, of St. Peter's Episcopal church, will be the speaker.

**St. Peter's Episcopal Church**—St. Peter's Episcopal church—the Mother church of La Grande—will honor all pioneers tomorrow morning during the regular morning service hour, which will commemorate its 63rd birthday anniversary in La Grande. The first Episcopal service in La Grande was conducted by the Rev. H. M. Parker on the third Sunday in July, 1864, and ten years later, in 1874, the first church was erected in La Grande at the corner of Fourth street and G avenue. In 1885 the church was moved to the corner of Fourth street and G avenue, where it stood until 1924, when the old church was torn down and the present one constructed on the same site.

La Grande pioneers will have charge of the services tomorrow morning, and addresses will be given by Rev. Mrs. Harriett Macdonald will talk on "The Days of Daniel Morris"; J. D. Slater will read the first article of incorporation; and L. H. Rowlett will talk on "The Church at a Later Period."

This service, which will start at 11 o'clock with morning prayer, will be preceded by holy eucharist at eight o'clock and the church school at 9:45.

**Lutheran Church**—Communion service will be held at the Lutheran church, Sunday morning, beginning at 11 o'clock. The choir will render the anthem, "Come, Ye Disciples." Graded classes for all are provided in the Sunday school, which begins at 9:45 o'clock with a brief period of worship.

**First Presbyterian Church**—Realities of Christianity will be the subject of the sermon brought by the Rev. J. George

Walk Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock worship hour at the First Presbyterian church. Miss Myrtle Wilcock will sing a solo. Sunday school precedes the church service at 9:45 o'clock.

At 6:29 o'clock in the evening the Senior Christian Endeavor society will hold its meeting in the community room of the church. The church will cooperate with other churches of the city in the union service at the First Methodist Episcopal church at eight o'clock.

**First M. E. Church**—Sunday school opens at 9:45 o'clock at the First Methodist Episcopal church, followed by public worship at 11 o'clock.

The union service will be held at this church at eight o'clock in the evening with the Rev. Carl H. Aves as speaker.

**Island City Community Church**—Sunday school meets at 10 o'clock at the Island City Community church. At the close of Sunday school Mrs. Ed Jasper will give a story sermon.

There will be no further services during the day, and it is hoped that all who care will attend the service at Wallawa lake, where the Epworth League institute is in session.

Sunday's program at the lake will open with morning watch at 7:30 o'clock, followed by public preaching services at 9:30. Dr. R. Earl Parker, of the First Methodist church of Portland, will be the speaker. In the afternoon at 2:30 o'clock there will be a sermon by Dr. Cyrus A. Wright, of the First M. E. church of Bain, Ida. There will be a young people's meeting at seven o'clock and a sermon at eight by Dr. Ira H. Aldrich. The evening address will be given by Dr. Harry S. Hamilton.

The annual business meeting will be held Sunday afternoon at four o'clock. All lot holders and members are requested to attend this meeting.

**East Side Methodist Church**—Sunday worship at the East Side Methodist church begins with Sunday school, which opens at 9:45 o'clock, followed by preaching at 11. The subject of the sermon, which will be given by the Rev. J. A. Hall, will be "Satisfaction, How and When to be Obtained."

The intermediate league will meet at six o'clock and the women's league at seven.

Union services for the north side will be held in this church, with the Rev. Oliver Riley as speaker. There will be special music both morning and evening.

**Christian Scientist Church**—Services are held regularly every Sunday morning at 11 o'clock at the First church of Christ Scientist, corner of First street and Washington avenue. The subject for tomorrow morning's service is "LIFE." Sunday school meets at 9:45 o'clock. Meetings are also held every Wednesday evening, which include testimonies of healing. ## VIENNA RIOTS UPSET STATE; CALLS STRIKE

several strike order which is said to have been issued by the socialist party and executives of the Austrian trades union.

The reports say the socialist party will send a delegation to Chancellor Schusner, demanding his resignation and also that of the chief of police of Vienna.

**Military in Charge**—One report said the military had the situation well in hand, having cleared the streets of rioters. Firearms had extinguished the fire in the palace of justice which is badly damaged, as were other buildings in the neighborhood.

Trains en route to Vienna were held up in the suburbs.

The Orient express was stopped at Graz, while trains from Germany to Austria were detained at the frontier.

**Many Killed**—Reports regarding the casualties were: One said 20 persons were killed and 700 wounded.

The extent of the destruction by the riots is uncertain, as the cutting off of communications between the Austrian capital and the rest of Europe prevented the full story from becoming known.

A rumor that Chancellor Schusner had been so injured by the riots was current, but has not been substantiated.

Disturbance some of the incidents he witnessed the correspondent of the Daily Express says he saw one section of the mob, chasing police down side streets and that when a policeman was caught he was killed ruthlessly with sticks or swords. Probably he faced a charge of ignominy and a large detachment of mounted police patrolled the streets in a regular cavalry charge, whirling swords over their heads.

While it was known today to what extent the records in the office of the registrar of deeds were destroyed in the fire, it is certain the burning even of only a part of them will mean untold damage as it will take years to reconstruct correctly property relationships, mortgages and similar questions.
