MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Fresh apples, ready-to-serve cereal, cream, creamed spinach with eggs on toast, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Toad tomato bouillon, salmon, pea and lettuce salad, glove leaf rolls, currant sauce, coconut macaroons, milk.

DINNER—Broiled veal steak, macaroni with tomato sauce, cucumber salad, frozen custard, milk, coffee.

Brush veal steak lightly with olive oil before broiling. The meat is so low in fat that extra fat is needed. Season with salt and pepper when done.

Frozen Custard
Three cups milk, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 1/2 tablespoon flour, 4 eggs, 2 cups whipping cream, 4 teaspoon salt, 1 table-spoon vanilla.

Beat eggs slightly. Mix and sift sugar, flour and salt and beat into eggs. Heat milk to scalding point in top of double boiler. Slowly add to egg mixture, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook, stirring carefully until mixture coats the spoon. Remove from heat and let cool. When cold, add vanilla and cream whipped until firm. Turn into mold and freeze in six parts ice to one part ice cream salt. It will take about three hours to freeze without stirring.
