HEALTH
WHEN YOUR ERROR MAY COST A LIFE

Member, Gorgas Memorial Inst. When using or administering drugs, keep in mind that error may cost a life, and never use drugs when in doubt about their use, dosage, effects, etc.

When using medicines, always follow directions explicitly. Insist that every bottle or container be well labeled. Always examine the label carefully, in a good light, before using. Then read it again. Always destroy unlabeled, or discontinued medicines.

Do not leave discarded medicines within the reach of children. Keep medicine cabinets, first aid kits, etc. securely closed. Thoroughly cleanse all containers that are to be refilled. Burn all others. Never keep old corks for further use. Consult your physician immediately if a wrong drug has been administered.

Since a three per cent solution of iodine applied to breaks in the skin is pretty sure to destroy offending germs, it is wise to keep a well labeled bottle in some place about the home, easily accessible to all. When applying iodine solution there are a few precautions to be kept in mind. Even a weak solution iodine must never be used as a wet dressing, like boracic acid, for example, as it will produce severe burns which are difficult to heal. It should be painted over the area to be treated, and allowed to dry thoroughly, in air. This is very essential if a dressing is to be applied later. The supply of iodine solution should be renewed occasionally, every three or four months, as the alcohol evaporates, quite readily, even in a corked bottle, and the solution becomes more concentrated until only the iodine crystals remain.

Too strong a solution of iodine may blister the skin, followed by its peeling off, and much discomfort. The bottle should be labeled: "Iodine Solution—Poison," and should contain a cork into which a glass rod is fastened, which dips down into the solution. This makes a suitable applicator. The container itself should be so distinctive that it will not be mistaken for anything else. Fire consequences may follow its intentional administration.

A three per cent solution used on all abrasions of the skin immediately, no matter how seemingly insignificant, will do much to eliminate the possibility of infections of varying degrees.

Lillian Gish Appears In "Scarlet Letter"

The stern intolerance of the early Puritans, their hardships and their fanatical opposition to all that savors of pleasure, form the background for Lillian Gish's most startling and dramatic role in "The Scarlet Letter," filmed from Nathaniel Hawthorne's classic, and which is opening a three day run at the Arcade theater, today.

The Hawthorne story has been placed on the screen with an amazing fidelity under Victor Sjöström's direction, and the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer feature is of a magnitude that lists it among the most important plays of the year.

But the interesting thing is the work of Lillian Gish. She entered on the role with a devout spirit akin to that of the actors in the Passion Play, as for six years she has longed to play the story as a tribute to her Puritan ancestors.

She brings to the role of "Hester Prynne" a breadth of understanding that makes the character absolutely live the tragic story of the woman, walked in by intolerance, who bore a brand of shame to shield the man she loved.

The dramatic climax of the picture gives her an opportunity to rise to sublime heights in her portrayal.

The story is staged on a lavish set, a Puritan village full of men and women and children is seen in the dramatic sequences, nearly a thousand people appearing in their quaint Puritan garb, and the cast is well suited to the story.

Lars Hanson, the Swedish Baritone, makes his debut in America as "Dimmesdale," the Puritan lover of the heroine, and Henry H. Wallhall, after her lover in "Birth of a Nation" plays her Nemesis in a convincing manner.

Karl Dane as Giles, the barber surgeon, has an eccentric role fully as effective as "Bill" in "The Big Parade," and William H. Tonker, Marcelle Corday, Mary Hawes, John Cowles, Little Joyce, Cond and James A. Marcus, complete a well balanced cast.

Star To Show Comedy Starring Stone

"The Prince of Headwaters," a powerful comedy-drama of father-love and made by the director of "Planning Youth," which starred Colleen Moore, is the feature photoplay at the Star theater Tuesday and Wednesday.

Featuring Lewis Stone, Priscilla Bonner, Lillian Tushman, Ann Rook, Robert Agnew, E. J. Hart, Cliff and A. Bore, the picture was adapted from Garret Fort's Liberty Magazine story, called also "The Prince of Headwaters."

Mr. Stone has the part of "the prince of headwaters," and most of the scenes are laid in the Hotel in New York.

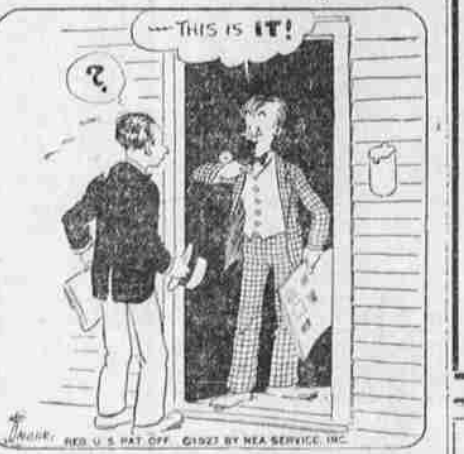
