A Dessert That Is Easy to Fix—'Floating Island'

WASHINGTON (AP)—A simple dish is the delectable dessert known as "floating island," says the United States bureau of home economics.

Put one quart of milk into a double boiler with one-half cup of sugar and one-eighth teaspoon of salt. When the mixture is hot drop the stiffly beaten, sweetened whites of five or six eggs on the surface by spoonfuls.

Let these "islands" cook for a few minutes until thoroughly set. Then skin them off and put aside until the custard is made. Beat the egg yolks lightly, and pour slowly into them some of the hot milk. Pour back into the double boiler and stir constantly until the custard coats the spoon. Remove at once and place the pan in a bowl of cold water, stirring until cool.

Add one teaspoonful of vanilla, or other flavoring, if preferred. Chill and serve in individual glasses or dishes.
