**BREAKFAST**—Cantaloupe, broiled cottage ham, creamed mushrooms, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Egg custard with mushrooms, rolled oats bread, celery, sugar cookies, lemonade.

**DINNER**—Baked beefsteak, anchovy sauce, steamed new potatoes, new peas in cream, cucumber and tomato salad, apple pudding, milk, coffee.

**Egg Custard With Mushrooms**  
 Five eggs, 1/4 pound fresh mushrooms, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1-2 cup milk, 1/2 cup coarse stale bread crumbs.

Peel and slice mushrooms. Melt two tablespoons butter in a sauce pan, add mushrooms, sprinkle with one-half teaspoon salt and cook, covered, over a low fire for
