FRANK DOLP WINS IN FIRST MATCH
Sets Her Wings for Rome Hop
Western Champion Successfully Defends Title in Seattle, Wash.
SEATTLE, July 20. (AP)—With a score of four and two Frank Dolp of Portland, today safely defended his crown in the first match of the western amateur golf tournament against Tom Green, of Seattle. They turned the first nine all-even.
The 32 qualifiers started elimination match play today, with 18 holes this morning and another 18 this afternoon between the surviving 16 players.
The quarter and semi-finalists will play 36-hole matches tomorrow and Friday, respectively, with the final 36-hole match Saturday.
Chandler Egan, of Medford, Ore., celebrating his 25th anniversary of winning the western amateur title, scored best in the entire field of 32 players on the outward morning journey. He got a 23 over the par 35 this and turned three up on Ben Stevenson, of Chicago. His card showed four 4's and four 2's with a finishing par five. This included two birdies and all the other holes in even par.
Two upsets took place when Keele Carter, Oklahoma City, 1925 champion, was defeated by Faye Coleman, Los Angeles, 2 and 1, and when Eddie Withler, Portland, Pacific Northwest champion, was beaten by the same margin by his townsman, Guy Standifer.

Plans of 500,000 tons for cruises and 100,000 tons for auxiliary cruisers must be reduced to the size of secondary cruisers and restrict the caliber of their guns to six inches, asserting that if the United States builds these high-velocity auxiliary cruisers, Great Britain must do likewise.
