HEALTH

AT BIRTH BARE IS A HEAD; HEAD LARGER THAN CHEST. SUCH DIFFERENCES HAVE RESULTED IN SPECIAL DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE.

"The child is not merely a 'little man' or a 'little woman'; it is a child. And that is something different from the adult in its anatomy, its physiology and its disease conditions."
The child, whether well or ill, should be studied in his proper class, and judged by standards suited to his age and stage of development.

I will make just a few comparisons as examples. In the symmetrical adult the total height is eight times the length of the head, and the midway point falls upon the front of the pelvis.
Compare this with the new-born babe, whose whole figure is only four heads tall, that is, one-quarter of his entire height is head. This is normal for him. But imagine an adult with a head forming one-quarter of his height!

A child two years old is about five heads tall. At four or five his head is one-sixth of his height. After the age of six, growth from the waist down goes on more slowly, and at fourteen years the height is about seven heads. This is but one instance among hundreds of the constant changes in the growing child.

At birth the head is larger than the chest which contains the lungs and heart and part of the greatest blood vessels, and also the thymus gland which later, instead of growing, diminishes.
Picture an adult with the head larger than the chest!
The muscles of the child are comparatively small, weak, and soft. His bones contain only one-third part of the lime salts which give firmness, and two-thirds of animal matter which is pliable. In the adult the proportions are exactly reversed. In the young, the periosteum, that strong membrane lying next to bone, is thicker and richer in blood supply, and projects readily from the bone. Can you not see that different effects will be produced by violent injury under these different conditions?

The child has all his fat just under his skin and none packed around his internal organs, as in the adult.
In the adult the blood gives a per cent of the entire weight. In the infant the blood is only 3 per cent of the body weight. Do you think that the infant can endure hemorrhage as well as the adult? One could list hundreds of equally striking differences, not only in the anatomy but in the functioning of the body, and in its ha-

In the making, Boston brown bread should be steamed for about 12 hours in well-buttered molds and then baked to dry out the top. To make honey bran wafers mix one-half cup sugar with one-quarter teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon ginger, and 3 cups of bran. Add one-half cup of honey, one-half cup of milk, and one-half cup of melted butter. Drop from a spoon on a buttered pan and bake about 15 minutes.

Before painting, surfaces that have been varnished or enameled should be rubbed with fine sandpaper, curled hair, or fine steel wool until the gloss is removed. If such surfaces are marred, prepared varnish remover should be used, and the wood gone over afterward with steel wool or sandpaper to make it smooth.

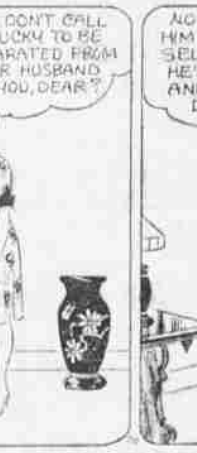
