MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Blackberries, cereal, cream, crisp bacon, soft cooked eggs, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Chilled fruit cup, green peas stuffed with rice and cheese, lettuce with French dressing, olive and nut sandwiches, meringues filled with raspberries, mousse, milk, tea.

DINNER—Frenched tenderloin of pork, kohlrabi in cream sauce, beet cups stuffed with spinach, chilled watermelon, milk, coffee.

One peach, 1 banana, 1 orange and a dish of lemon juice will combine to make enough "fruit cup" for four or five persons. This is one of the best ways to use up odds and ends of fruit. Be sure the mixture is not too sweet—its

mission is to whet the appetite. The cup must be served very cold.

Meringues

Four eggs (whites), 1 cup powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.

Beat whites of eggs with salt until stiff and dry. Slowly add sugar, beating constantly. Beat in vanilla. Let a flat smooth board about an inch thick stand in cold water until the surface is wet. Cover with "fool's cap" or any heavy glazed white paper. Drop the egg mixture from the tip of a large spoon onto the paper. Do not let meringues touch each other.

Bake in a moderately slow oven for 45 minutes. Scoop out the soft part inside the shells and return to the oven to dry out.

The eggs should be beaten on a large platter, using a wire whisk. Fine sifted granulated sugar can be used in place of powdered sugar if more convenient. When ready to serve fill each shell with cream and top with the centers that have been dried in the oven.

To produce clean-bodied timber close spacing is desirable. When the tops of the trees begin to intertwine and crowd each other, however, they become like an overcrowded garden, growth is stunted and thinning is necessary. The best formed, most valuable and healthy trees should be selected to remain and others, likely to interfere with their growth, should be removed.

"The United States produces an average of 110,000,000 pounds of wool annually, the bulk of which comes from the West. Most of the 1927 crop has been sold.

Standardization of wool grades is based on fibre diameter. Since wool is not highly perishable, it lends itself admirably to standardization. From the sheep's back, through the various channels of trade to the final manufacturing operation grade remains constant. Therefore the standards for grades of wool may be termed producers', merchants' and manufacturers' grades.

"It is believed they will be satisfactory in every phase of distribution and merchandising. For the grower, they introduce and stimulate better methods in the selection of animals for reproduction."
