Address of Welcome
Fred E. Kiddle, chairman of the convention, delivered a short address of welcome, on behalf of the American Legion and was followed by A. T. Hill, chairman of the city committee, who welcomed the visitors for the city.

Ex-Governor Walter M. Pierce, in a 20-minute address, extended a welcome in behalf of all Eastern Oregonians to the war veterans for the part they played in years ago in freeing the world of the German menace.

Referring to America's policies of today, he declared that "I am not in favor of aggression when it is for the purpose of making money."

Mrs. Herschler Responds
Mrs. Pierce was followed by State Commander Arthur Murphy, of Portland, who, after a few introductory remarks, presented Mrs. Anna Herschler, of Hood River, auxiliary president, who responded to the addresses of welcome.

Mrs. Herschler expressed her appreciation of the welcome given and the hospitality shown in short but very well given talk. She spoke briefly about the American Legion auxiliary and in closing renewed the pledge of the auxiliary to the legion to assist in all undertakings and work with the legionnaires.

Mills Speaks
The department commander then introduced Charles Mills, national head of the 40 and 8 society, of Miami, Fla., who paid a glowing tribute to Oregon—its scenery and its people. He said that he was impressed with the turn the American Legion is taking in its program of community service. He reviewed the things the American Legion stands for and declared that the legion members realized that the organization has a serious purpose.

In speaking of the organization which he represents, Mr. Mills said that the 40 and 8 society had long been known as the play ground of the American Legion. He personally believes that it is the work shop of the legion. "Only the men who give the best of service to the legion are admitted to the 40 and 8 society and of the legion to make the American Legion the best peace time organization in history."

Honor Organization
In a short interview following his talk Mr. Mills declared a new program had been adopted by the 40 and 8 society, and that play was secondary in its workings. "It is necessary for a legionnaire to do a meritorious service for his community, for the legion, for his state or nation, before he can become a member of the 40 and 8. He is then selected by the 40 and 8 members for membership. It has become an honor organization of the American Legion, in the place of a frivolous, fun making body. We do have fun," he declared, "but it's clean fun."

Dan Sowers, national chairman of Antiochianism was then introduced by Commander Murphy, who in appropriate words expressed his admiration of being in La Grande for the convention and his appreciation of the hospitality shown. Mr. Sowers has a friendly personality, and succeeded in keeping the large audience in a roar of laughter.

Represents Mrs. McCauley
Mrs. A. R. Beales, national vice president of the Western district of the American Legion auxiliary, was the next speaker introduced. Believes Coolidge Will Not Be a Factor in Presidential Race

NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—New York newspapers today quote Senator Thomas J. Walsh, democrat, Montana, as expressing the opinion that an anti-third term resolution will be adopted by the seventh congress and that President Coolidge will decline a re-nomination in defense to the third term tradition.

Even should Coolidge be re-nominated, which Senator Walsh believes improbable, the Montana senator believes he will be defeated.

Senator Walsh said he had no doubt that Senator La Follette would again introduce his third term resolution which failed of action by the late congress.

"I assume," said Walsh, "that it will receive the full democratic vote in the senate and with Senator La Follette sponsoring it and Senator Moses, of New Hampshire, and other republican members openly against the third term I have no doubt it will be adopted."
