Fire Sweeps Over Town of Chiloquin

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 22. (AP)—Business buildings, a lumber yard and several residences were completely destroyed in a fire which swept through the business section of Chiloquin, reservation town, late yesterday afternoon. Loss estimated at \$100,000 was sustained.

The fire started in a shack back of a Main street pool hall, and because of the absence of a fire department and fire fighting equipment, the flames got beyond control before volunteers could organize to combat the flames. Hose, chemicals and other apparatus were rushed from the plant of the Forest Lumber company plant nearby, thus saving the town from total destruction.

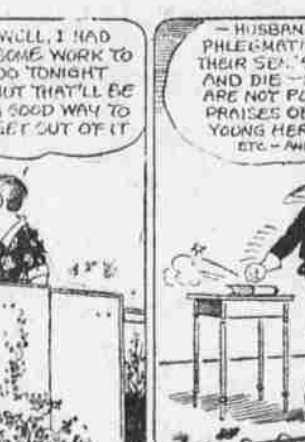

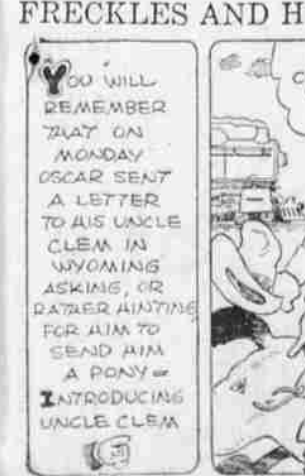
