Mrs. P. D. Armour, Society Dowager, Dies in Chicago

CHICAGO, July 25 (AP)—Mrs. P. D. Armour, 85, widow of the founder of Armour and company died here today. The society dowager was the mother of J. Ogden Armour, who is ill in England. Mrs. Armour had been ill for some time. Because of her condition, she was not informed of the illness of her son. The latter's wife is with him and their daughter, Mrs. Lollia Armour Mitchell, and her husband, John J. Mitchell, Jr., are enroute to England. Mrs. Armour was born at Cincinnati, Ohio on May 7, 1842. She grew to young womanhood in her parents' home at Cincinnati where she received her education, and in October, 1862, at the age of 20, she married Phillip Danforth Armour, later destined to become a capitalist and head of one of the greatest packing industries in the world. In 1868 her husband established the firm of Armour and company, coming here from Milwaukee where Mr. Armour had been engaged in a commission business. Her son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Armour, Ogden Armour on Nov. 11, 1863, and Phillip D. Armour, who died some years ago. Much of the success of Armour and company was attributed to the able manner in which Mrs. Armour assisted her husband during the pioneer years of the business. And later, as the family grew wealthy, Mrs. Armour made a number of large gifts to society, especially following her husband's death, Jan. 6, 1901.

Auxiliary Resolutions The American Legion auxiliary in the last session Saturday passed resolutions dividing the money made from the puppy sale this year; to make an effort to see that the national anthem of America is correctly sung; supporting the program of the therapy department for hospital No. 117; in appreciation of publicity given by the Pacific Legion; in buying supplies during 1928, to buy only those made by ex-service men in government hospitals; that the war veterans act be amended to increase the amount payable to veterans in the hospitals for the insane, since \$20 a month is inadequate; that the World War veterans act be amended to provide for dependent parents of disabled ex-service men over the age of 20 years; that the silver history medal award be used in the public schools for the best essay on national or civic subjects; that where no hospitalization plan is provided for elements with disability rated at less than 10 percent, that such pay be granted.

Favors Hospitals Legislative resolutions passed were that the American Legion auxiliary be required, covering the establishment of a fund by congress for the purpose of placing neuro-psychiatric hospitals in every state in the union under the direction of the U. S. Veterans Bureau. Also, a resolution was passed that the department favored the enactment of the state legislature of a bill authorizing county clerks throughout state waive all court costs in connection with guardianship matters of incompetent ex-service men or minor children of disabled or diseased ex-service men.

Grief General Over Death of Mr. Crumpacker

By the Associated Press Comments made today on Congressman Crumpacker's death follow: Governor Patterson: "I am deeply grieved by the tragic death of Representative M. E. Crumpacker. He was an able and devoted public servant and a fine man. In his brief experience in the house of representatives he had made a place for himself which the state of Oregon will find it difficult to fill. His death in the prime of a useful life means a great loss to his many personal friends and to the state for which he rendered such loyal service." Senator McNary: "Representative Crumpacker was energetic, aggressive, capable and his loss to the state seems almost irreparable at this time. He was of the type in mind and personality that sees quickly in public life, and had he lived he doubtless would have been one of the most influential members of congress, and would have done great good for his district and his state." Representative W. C. Hawley: "Congressman Crumpacker evidenced a natural aptitude for public service, and disclosed abilities of a high order. He was well respected by the members of the house and officials in Washington generally, because of his industry, his well informed mind, his sensible judgment and the care with which he attended to his duties. I think he was scheduled for a brilliant career and his untimely death is a great loss to the state and to the country."
