HEALTH
RIGHTS OF THE DISFIGURED
By J. Eastman Sheehan, M. D., New York City.

If great numbers of people have gone through the world bearing facial disfigurement with a sort of fatalistic stoicism, assuming that nothing could be done for them and that there was nothing left but to "grin and bear it," the obvious and sufficient explanation is that they did not know any better. Moreover, their medical advisor usually offered them no comfort, and if they consulted a surgeon they got no further ahead. Until very recently the surgical profession had not seriously grappled with the problem, and the medical profession knew it. In his journey from pillar to post and back the victim abandoned hope, for which none could blame him.

Looked at in retrospect, it seems rather curious that this should be so, and that even hairy men, small "port wine stains," small scars from burns, distorted lips, and like identities should have been considered outside the range of the art that has done such wonders in presence of greater ills.

The explanation, however, is simple enough. These apparently trifling problems were yet serious enough to have to wait for solution until the profession got around to them, as well as to the treatment of severe burns, extensive injuries, wounds, etc., and it took a World War to convince the surgeons that there was a duty to discharge and also that there was a way to discharge it. The disfigurements of peace were first clearly seen through the red spectacles of war.

After the problem was seen there remained only the development of methods and the installation of facilities. Both were necessary and both had been lacking in the past.

The position today is very different from what it was five years ago. In all the great centers of population on this continent there is now at least one hospital that has set up a department for the care of such cases, and in each instance there is at least one surgeon who keeps abreast of the latest developments. It is only a matter of time until these facilities will be duplicated in the smaller cities, for practicing surgeons are taking courses here and abroad, in this sort of surgery, so that before long the present small number of competent surgeons will be multiplied many fold and every hospital will deal with disfigurements as part of the regular routine.

Even today it is no longer possible for the family physician to report that nothing can be done; the discussion is limited to considerations of distance and expense to reach the patient and persons ready to make the correction of the dis-
