Farm Pointers

The proper length of time that a cow should be dry depends on the quantity of milk she has produced and on her condition of health. Cows of low or medium production should be dry a month or six weeks. High producers require a longer dry period.

Chestnut killed by light is being replaced naturally by oak to a large extent. The chestnut trees are doomed, and stands running heavily to chestnut should be removed clear cut to accelerate growth of other species. In 1 trees of other valuable types should be left to stock the woods.

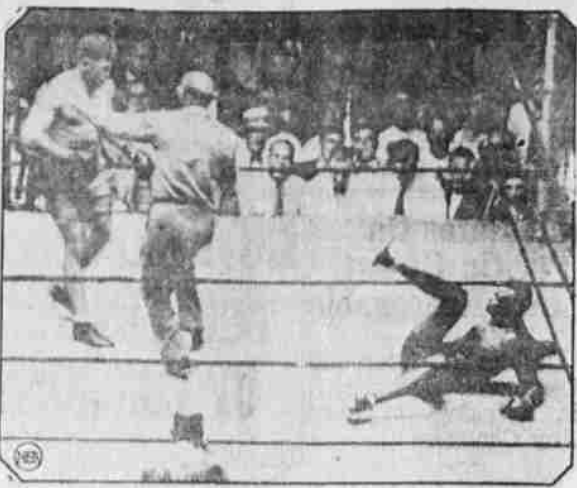
The 27,000,000 dairy cows in this country, with an estimated average production of 4,500 pounds of milk annually, are better and more economical producers than they were a few years ago. During the last eight years there has been an increase of 100 pounds of milk per cow.

In a locality where there is a market for wood for hand saws, ash, birch, larch, alder, sugar maple and white oak are the best trees to encourage or replant in the farm woodlands.

Some kind of moist food for hens is desirable for maximum egg production and also to keep the birds in good condition. Most of the staple grains do not fully supply the protein requirements of the hen. For this reason (meal scraps generally are used in the dry or wet mash rations. Milk in some form, while not actively fattening the place of meat, provides part of the necessary protein and is a good supplement to the regular diet.

Prevention of most spoilage early begins before slaughter. Having the live animals in pen or night, with plenty of clean water but no food, usually will diminish the number of destructive organisms in the flesh.
