Miss Mae Shanks who is now making her home in Pendleton, is at Union, called here by the serious illness of her sister, Mrs. Wallace Greenwood.

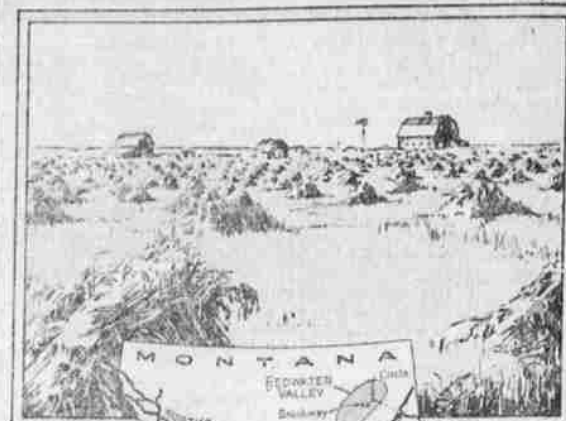
