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Paris Journal Warns America What To Expect

PARIS, July 28 (AP)—A communique printed today by L'Ouvrier Quotidien, a newspaper, addressed to American intellectuals, professors, lawyers and artists, said that if Havel and Vansetti should be executed, Americans coming to France "would be received with the usual welcome, but there would be between us a chll, a shadow, that neither you nor we could understand."

Alfred Dreyfus, who served several years in the French penal colony on Devil's Island on a false charge, and who has accepted membership on a committee whose

announced intention is to go to the United States to plead the cause of the two condemned men, personally supervised the writing of the communique.

Explaining the communique, Jean Pictet, of L'Ouvrier Quotidien, said it was "not a threat against American tourists—just a warning of what may happen."

"The statement emphasizes that a country, which heretofore has been known as the cradle of fair play, must take into account the world's opinion."

"We regret anarchy, lollapalooza, violence," it continues, "but it seems to us that if there is doubt about the culpability of Havel and Vansetti, they should not be executed. Everything that has taken place since their sentence has reinforced doubt, instead of confirming the conviction."

Asked whether he would go to America if the committee went, Pictet answered "Yes," but it was learned later that this would depend on whether the committee designated him a member of a representative delegation, the composition of which has not yet been discussed.

FIVE IN JAIL IN FLOGGING CASE

Two Women and Three Men Arrested—Trial to Begin on August 1

FLORENCE, Ala., (AP)—Mrs. Bertha A. Ray, principal in the most sensational of Alabama's flogged cases, will appear in criminal court here August 1 to testify that two women and three men dragged her from her bed, bound her to a barrel and whipped her with links of iron and an unwhippable fan belt.

The five masked and robed persons forced their way into the Ray farm home near here, tied the woman's hands and feet, Miss Lulu Hudson, to their heads and dragged her out of doors, where the flogging took place.

She said nothing of the affair for several days, then told county officials that members of a hooded order, tied the woman's hands and feet, and dragged her to a barrel, where she was flogged for three days. She charged the men, saying she had recognized two men in the party by their long hair and small feet, and absolving members of the secret organization.

Accused followed, Walker K. McAdams, chief of the state law enforcement department, conducted an investigation and secured warrants for Mr. and Mrs. Allen Butler, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Lindsey and Charles Lindsey, all of Florence, charging them with complicity in the flogging.

All five are held in the Lauderdale county jail pending hearing of the charges August 1.

The Ray flogging is one of five similar affairs brought to the attention of Alabama authorities within two weeks, and which have caused Governor Bibb Graves to order special state investigators to cooperate with local officials in an effort to "check mob violence."

Jeff Callaway, Oklawaha, Ala., farm youth, was taken into a dense woods by a band of masked men and flogged until unconscious. Officials of Jefferson county, Alabama, were looking into the whipping of Arthur Hill, negro landowner, who was flogged when he refused to sell a tract of valuable land for a nominal sum. Three days after the whipping he transferred his land for a price said to have been one-sixth of its value.

Other flogging cases under scrutiny are those of Helen Murchison of Lenoir, Ala., who was taken from an automobile and whipped because he was riding with "two strange girls," and Hugh Mykewitz and Pearl Rogers, who were lashed on a road near Birmingham several weeks ago.
