RACERS OF OLD REIGN IN STUD

Fair Play and Man O' War Ranked Among Leading Sires

LOUISVILLE, Ky.—The average race track devotee knows or guesses little about thoroughbreds of the turf after they have passed the five-year-old stage. Some horses, of course, like the famed Easterner, continue their track careers for years after crossing this mark, but most of them pass quickly into oblivion as racers.

Breeders, however, know that country in general opinion of their usefulness and longevity of their offspring extend many years longer, or in some cases, more lucrative reign in the stud.

Fair Play, sire of the great Man o' War, and of Mod Play, Ladite, Mad Hatter, Stronbold, Poole, the Fair, Barnds of Pleasant Chance, Day, Bravado, Charlie, and the latter one of the most promising three-year-olds of the year—and many others—will monarch of the stud of Joseph L. Widener's (Clarendon) stud, near Lexington.

Fair Play was foaled in 1892, three years ago at the diamond side of the thoroughbred stock of the late August Belmont, Jr. and Mr. Widener, the total sum of \$140,000. Man o' War, his racing days over, is now ranked as one of the leading sires of the present generation.

Bromfield, foaled in 1881, is the property of Harry Payne Whitney's breeding farm near Lexington. Many turf experts contend this horse has sent more good sires in the past than any other sire in America. He comes from a long-lived family of thoroughbreds.

The sire, Ben Brush, 1861-25 years and the latter's grandchild, Bonnie Scotland, was 27 when he died.

Glanah, imported by R. W. Cameron, of the Clifton stud, New York, was foaled in 1866 and died at the farm of Tyson Duns, Cal.

NEW YORK (AP)—In every year since 1922, big league baseball has produced at least one pitcher of a no-hit game—but the 1927 season edges toward its close with no such performance by its record, though more than half a dozen men who have pitched no-hit games still labor in the majors.

In eleven years, nine pitchers have entered the hall of fame with hitless performances. Hank for the Athletics in 1916, Robertson for the White Sox and Jim Barnes for the Giants in 1922, Elmer for Boston and Jones for the Yankees in 1924, Haines for the Cardinals in 1924, Vance for Brooklyn in 1925 and Lyons for the White Sox in 1926. This year's best performance so far has been 160's one-hit game for the Chicago Cubs against Pittsburgh.
