Clara Bow At Colonial In "Parisian Love"

Clara Bow, that clever little actress whose versatility is ever amazing, wears again in a colorful role in "Parisian Love," the R. P. Schulberg picture which opened last night at the Colonial theater. She plays the part of a little Apache girl in the underworld of Paris and her naive charm has never been seen to better advantage.

Donald Keith, the tall, handsome lad who made such a hit in "The Boomerang," another Schulberg picture, does fine work opposite Miss Bow. Lou Tellegen is fine in the role of the scientist whose kindness brings about the regeneration of the Apache characters portrayed by Miss How and Keith. Other players whose work is outstanding are Lillian Leigh and Nathan in a role ideally suited to her ability as a character actress. James Gordon Russell, Jean de Briac, Otto Matsson, Alyce Mills and Hazel Keener. The latter two have only small parts in the film, but their presence adds a great deal of beauty to the picture.

The picture has its setting in the Parisian Mont Martre district where the Apaches dwell, although the scenes shift occasionally to the society realm. It unfolds a delightful romance between the Apache boy and girl and their regeneration occurs so naturally that one forgets that it was planned artifice.

The direction was ably handled by Gasnier, whose pictures are consistently good. The story was written by P. Oakley Crawford and adapted to screen form by Lois Hutchinson. This photograph of the picture, which is outstanding, is credited to Al Siegler.
