### MODEL BANKING SYSTEM

Banking systems, like prophets, sometimes enjoy more honor in foreign lands than in their own country. American citizens who know little and seem to care less about the federal reserve bank system, should be a little stirred by the respect that prominent foreign bankers feel for it.

Reginald McKenna, head of England's largest bank, recently proposed that the British banking system be re-organized and that our reserve system be studied with a view to adapting it to Britain's needs. A prominent London banker, now deceased, said the same thing a few years ago.

Since the war, it is reported, 17 countries have revised their banking systems, using the American federal reserve as their basic pattern. Most of these are minor countries. Recently, however, Japan has shown signs of joining their ranks by preparing to adopt a banking system of this type.

Its high degree of flexibility, warding off violent inflation and too speedy deflation, is one of its particularly attractive advantages in the eyes of these foreign banking experts. It would be a good example of midsummer patriotism for any citizen who doesn't know what this is all about to investigate the federal reserve system a little and give it the honor it deserves.

### Ford Trying Out New Car; Drives Near Dearborn

DETROIT, July 29 (AP)—Major and speed tests of the new automobile shortly to be introduced on the market by Ford Motor company are being made here, personally by Henry Ford, it was announced today.

The manufacturer has been engaged for the past few weeks in driving the car over roads in the vicinity of Dearborn, Mich. The announcement from the executive office of the corporation said the results of the tests were not disclosed and officials did not indicate if they were in favor of the new design.

Ford, who celebrated his 64th birthday today at home today, indicated he had completely recovered from a stroke received in a recent accident.

### GOVERNOR MUST CALL ELECTION

#### Successor to Crumpacker Can Be Picked No Other Way, Attorney Says

SALEM, Ore., July 29 (AP)—The constitution of the United States and the laws of the state of Oregon require that Governor Patterson shall call a special election in the third congressional district for the election of a successor to the late Congressman M. H. Crumpacker. This was held by Attorney General Van Winkle today in a formal opinion written in response to an inquiry by the governor.

As to the time when the election shall be called, that is discretionary with the governor, and for the present a matter of conjecture. The Oregon code says that certificates of nomination of candidates in the special election may be filed with the secretary of state between the date on which the governor issues the writ of election and a date to be fixed by the election. Also, after the governor has issued his proclamation, the secretary of state must give the people of the district notice of at least 75 days of the officers to be elected.

There are three methods of nominating under the Oregon laws. These are by political parties in a primary election, by petition of individual electors and by an assembly of 100 or more voters. Ordinarily in the special election under consideration there would be no preceding primary election, hence only the other two methods are left. However, an assembly of voters might be predominantly the leaders of any political party, and the assembly could by its slogan on the ballot convey its political faith to the voters. The question of whether a voters pamphlet shall be issued is something of a problem. Any questions as to the legality of nominations, petitions, etc., will be submitted later to the attorney general.

The attorney general in his opinion quotes the constitutional provision that "when vacancies happen in the representation from any state the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies," also the Oregon code to the same effect.

After quoting the federal constitution the attorney general says that "under the existing circumstances it is the duty of the executive to issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy."

A state constitutional amendment voted by the people in November, 1924, relative to filling vacancies, the attorney general holds does not apply in the case of representatives in congress.
