Don McKay left today for Portland where he will spend several weeks. He accompanied William Siegrist and family, who are driving to Seaside, as far as Portland.

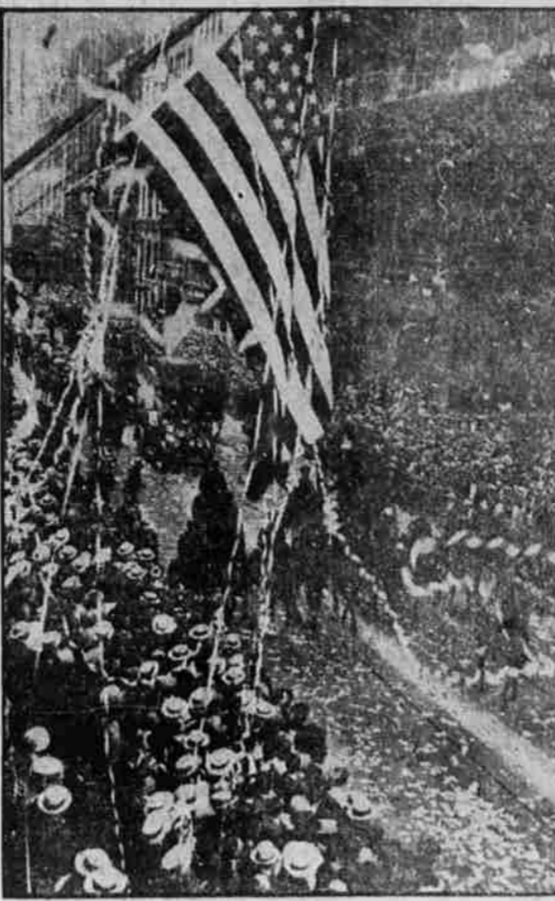
Bathrooms Received—

COWARDICE AND BRAVERY MIXED

Two Members of Favorite's Crew Came Ashore—Others Saved Many

CHICAGO, July 29 (AP)—Two of the crew of the excursion boat Favorite paddled away from the craft on a life raft, making no effort to rescue passengers struggling in the water, a survivor, Charles Thomas Abernathy, today told a coroner's jury investigating the disaster. The Favorite, loaded with holiday makers, foundered off Chicago harbor Thursday during a squall, drowning 27 persons.

Abernathy, who lost two sons, also said life belts on the Favorite were "black with age and come apart in my hands." William A. Hofbauer, yachtman, first to reach the swamped boat, and Leo Zozola, a survivor, testifying before a federal investigation, said the crew of five men saved many lives, continuing their rescue efforts until exhausted. Abernathy declared when the boat began to rock from the force of the wind he took down a life belt. "Two of them came apart in my hands," he continued. "They were black with age and rotted. I finally got one down and attempted to put it on my wife. It wouldn't stay on her." After being thrown into the

water when the Favorite capsized, Abernathy said he held his wife in his arms. "I could not see the boys and I never saw them again alive. When we came to the surface, I saw two members of the crew a hundred feet away, paddling for shore. They made no effort to save those in the water. After a while the boat came along and we were rescued."

The boat is Hofbauer's boat. Hofbauer told the federal investigators he saw members of the crew pull many persons out of the water. "They were diving below and reaching down under the canopy of the upper deck, which was submerged, for passengers," he declared. "They worked until I could see they were almost exhausted." Captain Olson, he continued, "acted as a captain should."

Bodies of Seven U.S. Soldiers Are Found In France

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—The bodies of seven members of the 78th who were killed in action at the battle of Saint Pons have been discovered in an isolated shell hole in France.

A search by the war department has been in progress in French battlefields for nine years in an effort to locate and identify all American dead.

The bodies found included that of Lieutenant William A. Sheehan, Company E, 15th Infantry, whose home was in Washington, D. C. With the other seven the bodies of six enlisted men.

Irving S. Roffe, Brooklyn; August H. Rindler, Baltimore; Edward C. Moran, Philadelphia; James E. Schall, Philadelphia; Elmer F. Kowitz, Baltimore; Henry P. Keller, Louisville, Ky.

The report received from France by the war department said the bodies were buried and the identification was that burial was by German troops.

The war department records show that these seven men were killed in action on the morning of Sept. 29, 1918, in the woods of the Bois des Oignes, near the ferme de La Ha-Belaine.
