**CHICAGO WOMEN HAVE  
SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA**  
CHICAGO, Ill. (AP)—The Chi-  
cago Women's Symphony orches-  
tra, one of three in the country,  
will enter its second concert ses-  
sion with the support of a formal  
organization behind it.

A little more than a year old,  
the orchestra made such a success  
in its first season that the Women's  
Symphony Orchestra Association  
was formed to back it up.

The association members include  
Mrs. A. J. Ochsner, Mrs. James A.  
Patten, Mrs. Arthur Meeker, George  
O. Linton, J. E. Greenbaum, and  
other well known Chicagoans.

The repertoire includes six stand-  
ard symphonies. The first concert  
was given in May, 1926, under the  
direction of Richard (Casper) Con-  
ductor and violinist of Chicago.

The only other women symphony  
orchestras in the country are in  
Los Angeles and Boston.
