Nation's Public Links Golfers In Tournament

CLEVELAND (AP)—Lester Bledsoe of Minneapolis, national public links golf champion, will defend his title against golfers from municipal courses throughout the country at the national public links tournament over the Ridgeview course here August 2 to 6. The competitors must not belong to any private club, and in addition to being amateurs they must play regularly in some municipal or tee course. Most of the contenders are youths, but there is no age limit.

When the event was inaugurated some years ago by James D. Randalish Jr. of Detroit, competitors came with rusty and mangled clubs. Nobody even hoped to forecast who if the group might win the title. In recent years, however, many winning champions have shown themselves first at the public links event. Many of the competitors have become noted players—among them Ray McAuliffe and clubs have taken in promising players, one of whom was Eddie Field of St. Louis.

Bolstad, 1926 public links champion, is a University of Minnesota star, and already this season has shown his mettle by being for second medal honors in the national intercollegiate tournament.

This year's meet will be played over a 6,500 course said to be as severe a test of golf as any private links. After the qualifying round, in which 32 entrants survive, the matches are of 18 holes until the finals.

5 DROWN DURING WEEK END PERIOD

Two Others Rescued from Water—Man Suicides in Willamette

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1 (AP)—Two instances of rescue, five drownings and one suicide were reported from Oregon rivers and lakes over the week end.
Miss Gladys Carlson, a Portland, nurse rescued Laddie and Mabel Fletcher, her nephews and nephews from the Columbia river near the interstate bridge.
Laudelle Chamberlain, rescued Lila Meloy from the Columbia river at Longview just after completing a swim across the river from Rainier, Ore.
Two drownings occurred at Lake Oswego. Larry Rego, 21, of San Francisco, was drowned Saturday, and E. P. Timmons, 21, of Multnomah station, drowned in the lake Sunday.
Paul Ingraham, 12, was drowned while swimming in the Columbia river. Sam Wang, 17, drowned at Crocker, 15, was drowned in the Willamette, Ore., and Goldie Sandman river near Jefferson.
The body of Leonard Chase, 47, who ended his life by drowning, was found yesterday in the Willamette river.

Airplanes Drill In Musical Time

LONDON, July 29 (AP)—A musical drill by airplanes was part of the royal air force pageant at London, a London suburb. The music was supplied by the air force band and transmitted to the pilots in the air by wireless.
