O.-W. CINDER MEN PLAN TO COMPETE

La Grande Team Entered In Bonneville Track and Field Meet Sunday

Nine O.-W. employees from La Grande will be entered in the O.-W. unit track contests which will be held at the annual unit picnic at Bonneville, Sunday, Aug. 7. About 2,000 persons are expected to attend the picnic and the track and field meet which will determine the contestants who will represent the O.-W. unit at the U. P. system meet at Provo, Utah on Sept. 6 and 7.

The team which has been picked to represent the La Grande U. P. athletic club is a strong one, providing entries in a number of track and field events. Carl Shumwood, holder of the Eastern Oregon low hurdles record and a sprinter and weight man in high school two years ago, Clark Price, Eastern Oregon record holder for the 440, Sam Walker, an experienced weight and 440 man recently out of high school, Forest Day, Blarke Graham, George Murphy, U. A. Plughoff, George Bowen and Austin Martin, of Imbler, comprise the team.

According to W. E. Walker,

chairman of the track team, the team is in good condition for the meet next Sunday. "Our boys are in fine shape and should make a good showing," he declared this morning.

FRENCH STRONG IN TENNIS DOPE

America May Be Hard Pressed to Retain Da- vis Cup This Year

NEW YORK (AP)—Is America's Davis cup team of this year facing the fate which befell Uncle Sam's representatives back in 1914?

After scanning the present tennis horizon it wouldn't be at all surprising were the famous trophy to go to a European invading force, just as it did 13 years ago.

In 1914, it will be recalled, Australia, led by the famous Anthony Wilding and Norman Brookes, swept the United States pastimes aside in one of the most thrilling and hotly contested battles in the history of the famous classic.

That year Wilding whipped Jack Williams, and so did Brookes. Wilding and Brookes also defeated America's sensational duo, Tom Bundy and Maurice McLaughlin, in the doubles.

McLaughlin, then famed as the "California Comet," saved America from a debacle by beating both Wilding and Brookes in the singles. The challenge round ended Australia 2, United States 2.

Australia this season sent over one of the greatest invading teams ever to compete for the cup. Wilding and Brookes were two of the outstanding players in tennis annals. As a pair they were virtually invincible.

That was the last time the two Australians ever played together. Rumblings of the war were being heard at the time. Upon their return to their native land Wilding and Brookes both entered the service. Wilding was killed soon after reaching the front. Brookes came through unscathed. Several years ago he essayed a comeback, but the once great racketeer was only a shell of his old self.

That 1914 reverse was the last an American entry met in Davis cup competition. Six years later Tilden and Johnston won back the coveted trophy, beating Australia 5 to 4. America has since retained the laurels, defeating Australia, Japan and France during the intervening six seasons.

Last year the French stars, Lacoste, Borotra, Brugnon and Cochet, extended the Americans but won only one of the five matches. This season the French punge again looms. In fact, the American team seems certain to encounter its severest test since Wilding and Brookes crashed through to victory 13 years ago.

With its two veterans, Tilden and Johnston, admittedly past their prime, and Richards no longer eligible, the United States has anything but a rosy prospect of maintaining its long international supremacy.

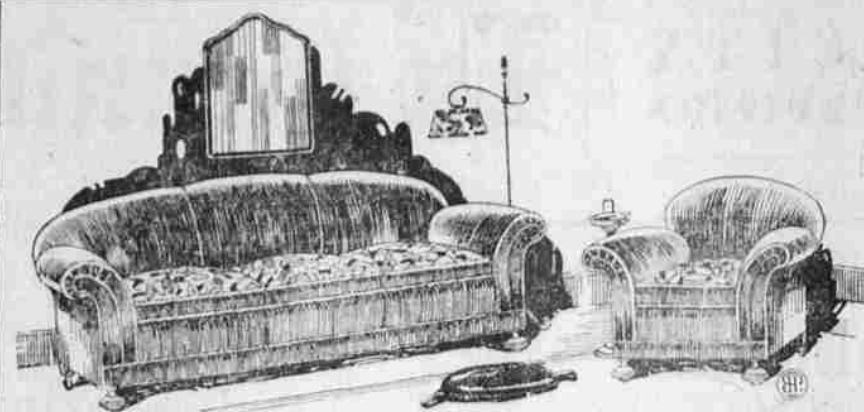
Hollywood Again Takes Portland; Oaks, Seals Win

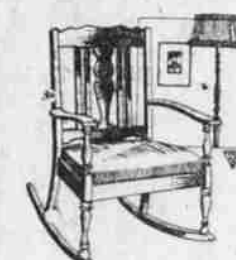

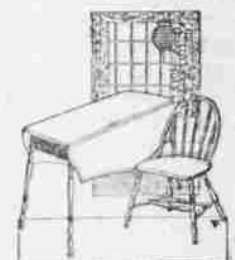
