CHANGE IN HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION BRINGS BETTER CARE FOR PATIENTS

In the war between the school medical world, on the one hand, and sickness on the other, the hospitals may be considered as fortresses and strongholds of a most efficient type. There was a time when hospitals were the dreariest, ugliest buildings, and they were considered adequate as long as they could hold the beds and the patients in them. During the life of the present generation a remarkable change has taken place in this respect, and hospitals are successful rivals of other prominent buildings to the credit of those who backed them and those who built them.

The front of a modern hospital nowadays is expected to conform to artistic ideas of architecture. There are columns and arches, ornaments and decorative material, in brick and stone, which, in conjunction with an attractive location, help to beautify the town. Similar improvements are found within, and there is a marked tendency to depart radically from the forbidding, austere impression of the old style hospitals.

Hospitals are best built in the shape of letters U, V or T, L or H, if they are designed as one

building. The hollow square construction is not so popular as it used to be. With ample grounds available, it is probably the wisest plan to erect several buildings with connecting galleries or corridors.

Inside of the modern hospital visitors are struck with the abundance of natural daylight and perfect ventilation. There should be no hospital odor in any part of the building, and one should never have a smell of the kitchen or laundry.

As to color in fitting the walls, a great deal of leeway exists for decorative effects, without jeopardizing perfect sanitation. A further advance in hospital construction is represented by the noticeable endeavor to depart from the universal use of glaring white in tiles and equipment.

There is no magic power that can be attributed to the white tile in the operating rooms, etc. On the contrary, a glistening white sends cold shivers up and down the spine. The most modern operating rooms use a soft shade of gray, without giving up an iota of cleanliness. Also greens and blues have been used for such filling.

The effect of these colors is soothing to the sensibilities of the patient, and it protects the eyes of the surgeon from the glare of the strong reflected light. White tiles have been retained in such departments as the kitchen, pantries, bath rooms, etc., where the cleanliness is done by a class of help not so dependable as the attendants in the operating room. Here the white color forms a check on the cleaners.

In order to have an efficient hospital it is essential that those who take care of the patients be in the best of health to fulfill their nerve-making duties. In the past little attention was paid to the welfare of the resident physicians and nurses. Very often the dining room was placed in the basement and, to reach it nurses and doctors had to dodge laundry trucks or bump into porters.

Now, however, this error is being corrected. Dining rooms, for example, are often placed on the roof with quarters fully as good as those provided for the patients. The patients are the ultimate beneficiaries, because nurses and doctors who have spent a few minutes in the open air and have enjoyed their meals in a cheerful dining room are much better fitted for their work.
