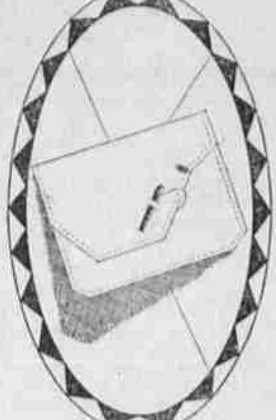

MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST — Grape fruit, crisp broiled bacon, scrambled eggs, bean meringue, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Timbales of ham and rice, toasted muffins, fruit salad, coconut crispie, milk, tea.
DINNER — Broiled lamb chops, carrot cups filled with green peas, banana and nut salad, peach shortcake, milk, coffee.

Timbales of ham and rice suggest an attractive way to use up bits of left-over ham. It's often real economy to buy a whole ham and if every bit, even the scraps around the bone can be used, little waste need be calculated.

Timbales of Ham and Rice
One cup finely chopped cold cooked ham, 1/2 cup cold boiled rice, 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon parsley.

Combine bread, crumbs with rice. Add milk and beat stand five minutes. Beat to make a smooth batter. Add ham, pepper, parsley and eggs well beaten. Mix thoroughly and turn into well-buttered ramekins. Bake thirty minutes. Turn out on platter garnished with sprigs of crisp parsley.

If ramkins are not at hand custard cups or muffin pans can be used.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6 (AP)—William C. Creed, president of the Pacific Gas and Electric company, and one of the best known business men in the west died at his home here today, after suffering from a stomach complaint since Sunday.

Creed was organizer and president of the First Bay Water company, president of the C. A. Hooper Lumber company, president of the Columbia Steel company, director of the Wells Fargo and Nevada National bank of San Francisco, the Associated Oil company of California, and several other corporations.

He was a resident of the University of California from 1918 to 1929.

Persian Moslems Outwit Turks, Observe Old Rites of Mourning

CONSTANTINOPLE (AP)—Shouting their forebears and necks with sharp swords, lashing their bare backs with chains and beating their breasts with their palms, Loun Persian soldiers of Stamboul succeeded in evading the Turkish police and carrying on this year as usual their annual mourning for two men slain 1,200 years ago.

The Persians were warned that the Turkish government intended this year to put a stop to the gory demonstration, staged every year on the tenth night of the moon in the Moslem month of Moharram.

But they gathered secretly in the courtyard of an ancient han, hidden in a shadowy corner of Stamboul, and laying costly Persian carpets on the cobblestones where camel caravans used to unload their burdens, they constituted an impromptu mosque whither to follow the spectacular rites, Persians have performed the ceremony on this night for thirteen centuries in memory of Hussein and Hussein, grandsons of the Prophet Mohammed, who were murdered by an usurping Caliph.

Turkish police, arriving on the scene after the hazy moonlight orgy was over, arrested some hundred of the self-wounded, bleeding participants, while a thousand Persians packed in the courtyard rent the night with their wails and woe of "Hussein! Hussein!"

A black robed, black gloved Persian priest, mopping his eyes with a huge black handkerchief, worked himself into a frenzy while he wailed over and over the story of the ancient murder in all its gruesome details, telling of how the young Hussein was poisoned by his own treacherous wife, an accomplice of the villainous Caliph, and of how Hussein, wandering half dead with thirst in the desert of Damascus, was found by the usurper's men and beheaded.

Though both Persians and Turks are Moslems, the Persians belong to the Shiite sect, which refused to recognize the line of Caliphs founded by the usurper.

Since the seventeenth century all Turks have been Sunnites. Nowadays some 20,000 Persian Shiites reside in Turkey peacefully, and the only opposition by the Turkish government is its attempt to put a stop to the annual flagellations of its Persian guests.

SACCO, VANZETTI ASK NEW TRIAL

Motion Filed by Defense Counsel in Norfolk County Courts

BOSTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—Counsel for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti today filed in the Norfolk county superior court at Dedham a motion for a new trial for the two men and petitioned Governor Alvan T. Fuller for a stay of execution.

BOSTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—The Norfolk county court house at Dedham, where Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were convicted of murder six years ago and where they were sentenced to death last April, again was the center of interest in the case today. There was a general expectation that counsel for the two men, whose reprieve expires on August 19, would make some move there looking toward an effort to obtain a new trial.

The probable procedure in such a move would be for Arthur D. Hill, who has become chief defense counsel, to file a motion for a new trial with the clerk of the court at Dedham.

Sacco continued his hunger strike at state prison today for the 21st day. Vanzetti, who intermittently has refused to eat, rejected the prison breakfast this morning.

Michael A. Musmanno, a lawyer who has been associated with the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee, who was at Hill's office, told newspapermen that he expected to go to Dedham later in the day to file papers in the court there.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 6, (AP)—An order of Federal Judge W. J. S. Thompson was filed into United States district court today directing the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan to show cause September 2 why the organization should not be enjoined from operating in Pennsylvania and a receiver appointed over its property in this state.

The court order, signed by Judge Thompson yesterday at Cambridge Springs, Pa., followed the filing of a suit by the Klan against five men, who, the Klan alleged, collected funds for the organization.
