force that walls of masonry were torn away, holes were blown upward through the sidewalk, blocks at the subway entrance were practically demolished and windows of adjoining buildings were shattered four stories up from the street.

MAYOR'S HOME BOMBED

BALTIMORE, Aug. 6 (AP)—The home of Mayor William F. Broening was damaged by a bomb at 6 o'clock this morning, which terrified his wife and two children, set fire to the rear and rocked the exclusive Forest Park section in the city's north-west quarter.

The mayor was at the time en route to St. Louis and the police were unable to assign any motive for anyone to mark him and his family for death.

George G. Henry, chief police inspector, refused to express an opinion as to the motive. "The police are trying to learn that now," he said. In other quarters, however, the outrage, taken in connection with the bomb explosions in New York and Philadelphia last night was held to Sacco and Vanzetti sympathizers.

At 2 a. m. they were awakened by the unusual barking of a neighbor's dog. They listened and believed they heard someone prowling around the house. The son, William P. Broening Jr., 21, telephoned the police. Three officers arrived and after an inspection of the premises said there was no one about.

The blast was extinguished quickly but the women found the bomb explosion had cracked the rear walls. Police found particles of the bomb, which they believe were equipped with a timing apparatus to discharge it.
