WARNS ALIENS TO OBEY THE LAWS

Congressman Johnson, at Hoquiam, Wash., Talks on Sacco-Vanzetti

HOQUIAM, Wash., Aug. 8 (AP)—Warning to citizens and all aliens of the United States not to let their sympathy or wrong information lead away them as the day for the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti approaches was issued here today by Congressman Albert Johnson, chairman of the immigration and naturalization committee of the house of representatives.

"Aliens domiciled in this country should remember," said Johnson, "that if they partake in anti-government demonstrations here they end their chances of citizenship, which, now that it is harder to get, is that much more desired."

Liability to Deportation
Besides, they will be liable to deportation under the 1919 act. Referring to Sacco and Vanzetti as "baiters and murderers," Johnson's statement said:

"They are also anarchists and enemies to this government, but that fact had nothing to do with their conviction nor with their approaching execution. They should never have been admitted to the United States and under the new immigration act could not have been admitted."

"I know Governor Fuller of Massachusetts and know several of the board of citizens who assisted him in final execution of the murder charges and evidence. They are convinced that Sacco and Vanzetti are guilty and those men in my opinion are as guilty as were the McNamara brothers who blew up the Los Angeles Times building, killing twenty or more, and who confessed their crime after a great defense fund had been raised by sympathetic working men."

"They are as guilty as those who conspired to and did murder Governor Stuenkel of Idaho. They are as guilty as those who assisted the world war veterans at Congress, Wash., on the first Armistice day. They are as guilty as Berkman who tried to kill Frick in Pittsburgh and dodged deportation for a dozen years after serving his

prison term. Sacco and Vanzetti are aliens. That makes no difference. Had they been truly murdered by Americans, this government would have had to apologize to Italy and pay great sums in damages.

"Demonstrations may go on in other lands. That is the affair of other governments. Foreign demonstrations can neither effect nor frighten the U. S. government nor any sovereign state thereof. Those demonstrations began originally in order to create a 'situation' for the benefit of the communists of the world without any real knowledge as to the guilt or innocence of the murderers. Don't be fooled in that kind of propaganda. Union labor men and women should read the recent statement of Matthew Wood, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, that there is real anger from violent social communitarian activities which rage everywhere without check or restraint."

Citizenship Great Gift
Johnson added: "We hope soon to put through congress a law by which naturalized citizens, who after swearing allegiance to the U. S., wear black shirts and swear undying allegiance to Mussolini or any other dictator, or who support any other government, shall be deprived of their naturalization. Citizenship is the greatest gift the U. S. has to bestow. It has been gladly received by millions.

"The time has come when such acquired citizenship shall not be used by radicals to the danger of this great government."

PICK UP CLUE
PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 8 (AP)—Detectives today picked up a clue which they say may lead to the solution of the bombing of the Emmanuel Presbyterian church last Friday night. They decline to reveal the nature of the clue but said it was "red hot."

Lieut. Jacob Gomborow, head of the detective "radical" squad, expressed the belief that the threatening letter received by the Rev. Dr. Edward S. Howman, pastor of Emmanuel church was the work of a religious fanatic and not of the bombers. Gomborow said he was confident that the bomb had been hurled by sympathizers of Sacco and Vanzetti.

Police guards were still maintained today at public buildings, houses of officials, subway and trolley stations, banks and industrial and commercial establishments. An extra guard has been placed on the new Delaware river bridge between Philadelphia and Camden, N. J.

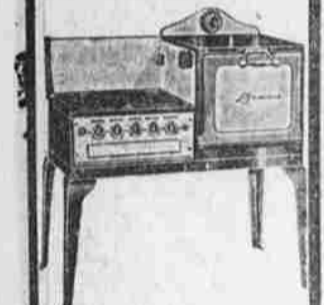
Armored Cars In Use By Police

NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (AP)—Armored cars have been added to New York's police precautions against violence, pending the execution of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti in Boston Thursday morning.

The greatest police guard in the history of the department, including concentrations during the world war, patrolled New York today from the tunnels under the Hudson river to railroad yards in Queens, far at the other end of the city while authorities searched for clues to those responsible for explosions that wrecked two stations on main subway arteries of the city Friday night.
