

LABOR PROTESTS DEATH DECISION

Green, of A. F. of L. Asks
Commutation of Sacco,
Vanzetti Sentence

The situation arising from the world-wide campaign of labor and radical elements to avert execution of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti headed for a crisis today as orders for extensive strikes here and abroad went into effect.

In point of numbers New York city led with up to 750,000 workers asserted by labor leaders to be ready to become voluntarily idle for the day. Thirty meetings were scheduled in the metropolis, the largest in Union Square where ten specially equipped police were ordered held in readiness.

Police Prepared
Fourteen thousand policemen, armored cars and emergency wagons equipped with machine guns and tear gas lamps were held in readiness for instant service.

Public buildings and the home of city and state officials were under heavy police guard at dawn. A special guard was established about Governor Alton T. Puffer with whom an appeal for stay of sentence has been filed, and about Judge Thayer, trial judge in the case.

Many arrests already have been made throughout the country in connection with demonstrations. Three men were arrested at New York after two bomb explosions rocked East River. Tom Connors, secretary of the Sacco-Vanzetti committee in Los Angeles was arrested on suspicion of criminal syndicalism in connection with his possession of literature urging people to attend a mass meeting arranged for today.

In New York Maurice Siegel, a Russian dentist was held for hours today, specifically charged with complicity in the subway explosion. Philadelphia police arrested eight men alleged to have attempted to incite transport and electrical workers to a 24-hour strike.

Three-Day Strike
An L. W. W. spokesman who organized a strike in the Southern Colorado coal field said 4000 men had left their work on the first day of a three-day protest strike.

Union officials predicted a strike of 8000 clothing workers in Boston. Labor conditions were also planned in New Haven and Waterbury, Conn.

Reaction to the sentence was indicated in at least one disturbance, numerous mass meetings and strikes in Europe. A number of people were hurt as police battled a hostile crowd marching against the American consulate at Cherbourg, France.

Taxi Drivers Idle
One thousand taxicab drivers were idle in Paris and part of the workers' population in the French capital and in many provincial cities went on strike.

General Branting, Swedish at-

torney who investigated the case for interested Swedish organizations, addressed a mass meeting of 15,000 in Stockholm, Sweden. Resolutions were adopted protesting against the sentence and asking a new trial for the two men.

President Green of the American Federation of Labor, appealed to Governor Puffer for commutation.

An Italian Catholic church in Chicago was bombed and police announced a belief that sympathizers with Sacco and Vanzetti did it.

LABOR APPEAL VOICED
ARIZONA, N. Y., Aug. 8 (AP)—Sponsoring for his organization William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor has appealed to Governor Puffer of Massachusetts for commutation of the death sentences of Sacco and Vanzetti.

In a telegram dispatched last night, Green asserted that in spite of the investigation, findings and decisions of the governor and his committee, many people still entertained "grave doubts" regarding their guilt or innocence.

His appeal, he said, was "in behalf of the millions of men and women" affiliated with the federation.

URGES APPEAL TO COOLIDGE
BOSTON, Aug. 8, (AP)—The Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee has telegraphed to U. S. Senator William E. Borah and Robert La Follette and to Miss Jane Adams, of Chicago, asking them to go to Rapid City, S. D., and walk as a delegation on President Coolidge with the view to inducing him to follow President Wilson's precedent in the Mooney case by ordering a federal inquiry into the Sacco-Vanzetti case.

Previous requests to Mr. Coolidge for intervention have been answered with the explanation that the president believed the matter exclusively one for Massachusetts to handle.

ADVERSE DECISION
BETHLEHEM, Mass., Aug. 8, (AP)—Judge Webster Thayer of the superior court today denied motions by defense counsel for a reversal of the death sentence and for a stay of execution for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti. The respite expires at midnight Wednesday.

The complete text of Judge Thayer's decision follows:
"The motion for revocation of sentence and stay of execution is hereby denied. To the denial of this motion, the defendants duly entitled all rights to which they are entitled as a matter of law, whether by exception, appeal or otherwise."
