DEATH OF FISH—Death of thousands of fish in Lake Klamath was declared by James E. Klamath, in a report submitted Monday to the state game commission.

THE commission instructed Harold Clifford, state game warden, to take up the matter of sewage disposal with the city of Klamath Falls, with a view to remedying the situation.

REPORT FOLLOWED AN INVESTIGATION which was ordered by the commission on learning that fish had been dying in large numbers in the lake.

It was declared in the report that the deaths were caused by a shortage of dissolved oxygen in the water, a condition alleged to be caused by sewage from the city.

WEALTHY RADICAL IS SENTENCED TO JAIL

BOSTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Edward Holton James, wealthy radical, today was sentenced to 10 days in jail on charges of inciting to riot and assaulting a policeman during a Bacon-Vanetti demonstration in Boston Common yesterday. James took the prison sentence rather than pay fines totalling \$75.

When arraigned before Judge Dowd in district court, James declared he refused to recognize the courts jurisdiction. He refused to rise for the reading of the complaint against him, saying he would stand up "before murderers, whether they are judges, police officers or governors."
