## Free Building Plan For The Farmers

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP)—A new branch of service to North Carolina—blue prints of farm buildings, ranging from colonial residences to lowly chicken coops—is proving a success.

The designs are furnished free by the extension division of the State College and records show that last year farmers availed themselves of more than 2,000 building plans.

In addition, an engineer follows the prints to the country to see that the buildings are constructed properly and economically.

## Half of All Farm Property Insured

Information obtained by the department of agriculture indicates there are 1,310 farmers' mutual fire insurance companies carrying risks that total approximately \$17,000,000,000, or about one-half of all the farm property insurable against fire in the United States.

In addition there are about 49 winterburn insurance companies carrying risks estimated at \$2,900,000,000; also, 28 hail insurance companies and 25 livestock insurance agencies, all farmers' companies operating on a cooperative basis.

## HOPES HELD

BOSTON, Aug. 10 (AP)—The possibility that the execution of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti might be postponed from early tomorrow morning was seen when Judge Sanderson of the supreme court announced today that he would not give his decision until tomorrow morning of a move by executive council. He is to de-

cide whether he shall permit a bill of exceptions from his refusal to grant writs of error and habeas corpus to go to the full bench of the supreme court.

Governor Fuller at 12:45 p. m. had made no announcement of his decision on a petition for a stay of execution.

The judges announcement followed a conference in chambers with Attorney General Read and Arthur D. Hill, chief defense counsel. Reading and Hill in a joint statement said they had agreed substantially on the form of the bill of exceptions and that the bill would be put in final shape this afternoon.
