

C. E. CONFERENCE CONVENES AUG. 29

Oregon Delegates Will
Gather at Turner,
South of Salem

Oregon's eighth annual Summer Conference will be held at Turner, Ore., Aug. 29 to Sept. 3. Turner is on the main Southern Pacific line, 10 miles south of Salem.

The conference committee consists of Miss Eley Walker, of Forest Grove, general chairman; Miss Josephine Robinson, of Corvallis, publicity manager; Mr. Dallas Rice, of Portland, business manager; Miss Viola Ogden, of Portland, registrar, and the Rev. Walter L. Myers of Eugene Bible university, dean.

The conference faculty is composed of the Rev. Walter L. Myers, of Eugene, dean of conference; Miss Hilda Anderson, of La Grande, agent of women; Dr. Norman K. Tully, pastor of First Presbyterian church of Salem, Bible study; the Rev. C. D. Garvey, pastor of Congregational church of Ashland, recreational director; the Rev. Paul C. Brown, Pacific Coast secretary of Christian Endeavor, devotional leader; Charles for the study of methods and activities will be taught by the following: June Walker, of Forest Grove, expert endeavor; Viola Ogden, of Portland, progressive endeavor; Catherine Moehle, of Eugene, junior leadership; Paul C. Brown, union leadership; Kathryn Rice, of Portland, intermediate leadership; Walter L. Myers, of Eugene, life vocations; Alice Guiley, of Eugene, poster making; Ross Guiley, of Eugene, song leadership; Dallas Rice, of Portland, society leadership; Mary Harding, of Sherwood, missionary leadership.

Dr. Tully's topics for Bible study will be "Jesus' Pathway to the Cross"; "His Baptism"; "Temptation"; "Peter's Confession"; "The Transfiguration"; and "The Last Supper."

One of the interesting special speakers will be Zeke Olson, of Hillsboro, former president of Washington Christian Endeavor union and high school teacher at Hillsboro, who is home on furlough from Bangalore, India. Some interesting features of the conference will be reports from the recent international convention at Cleveland by Oregon delegates, evening fire meetings under the leadership of Paul Brown, stunt night, and the annual conference banquet.

Advance registrations received at Christian Endeavor headquarters, 302 Abington Bldg., Portland, indicate a state wide interest in the coming conference as delegates have registered from Pendleton, Fremont, La Grande, Eugene and Ashland, as well as thirty other towns closer in. Delegates are urged to register early in order to facilitate accommodations.

Firebug Suspect Is Under Arrest At Roseburg

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 10 (AP)—A carefully planned and well executed guard system resulted yesterday in the arrest of D. L. Neidenheiser, Glendale mill worker, on a charge of setting forest fires.

Neidenheiser is accused of starting a string of forest fires on Stouts creek last Sunday.

According to H. G. Brown, supervising warden of the Douglas fire patrol the man has been suspected of setting fires for several years, but it has been impossible to obtain evidence against him. He had secured a contract to buy 150 acres of land near Paradise on Stouts creek, and the officers believe that he desired to burn off the surrounding state and government land so that its classification could be changed from timber to agricultural, throwing it open to homestead entry. He holds a game breeder's permit and has been preparing to raise deer commercially.

Incendiary fires on Stouts creek have been of annual occurrence and last year over 500 acres were burned over. This year the officers of federal and county forest organizations made a careful plan to apprehend firebugs in areas where fires have been started regularly in past years.

Dynamite Blast Wrecks Homes in Mining District

PICHER, Ore., Aug. 10 (AP)—Explosion of a dynamite magazine in the residential district of this mining center late last night wrecked or damaged more than a score of homes without causing serious injury to anyone, a survey revealed today.

Although many residents attributed the blast to redskins, authorities rejected this belief. Joe Nolan, chief of police, said investigation failed to indicate the cause of the explosion. He declared there had not been any radical demonstration in this district and that he would not consider the inquiry along those lines at this time.

The blast, which occurred on the property of the Vantage Mining company, wrecked a derrick, frame house and three nearby houses. Windows were shattered in a dozen buildings and hundreds of windows were broken. No one was treated at any hospital for serious injuries. Several were reported suffering from shock. Rafter estimated the damage at \$12,000.

J. A. Rhead, manager of the mining company, said there was about 150 pounds of dynamite in the magazine.

Chicago's "Riot Girl," Student in High School, Leads Demonstration

CHICAGO, Aug. 10 (AP)—Chicago's "riot girl," a new leader of the riotous element and previously recognized by the police, is a 15-year-old Aurora girl, a pre-law student at Chicago Technical high school.

She, with two other women and 24 men, was held by the police today on open charges after her screaming, unrelenting last night had turned a peaceful indoor protest meeting against the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti into a riot. Exotic mob of approximately three thousand which started a midnight parade toward Chicago's downtown district.

With their modern Joan of Arc screaming and posturing at their head, the protesters finally broke ranks and ran for refuge under the charge of police automobiles and the poisonous scattering of tear gas by the police.

Miss d'Angelo remained defiant until she was firmly pinned in a police automobile where her wild frenzy changed to a tearful pleading that "I'm only a kid, and this is free country."

Afoot and in those garbments little Aurora had not the advantage of an armored, equestrian Joan of Arc. She was swept aside to rush after rush, and her flimsy flapper clothing nearly was torn from her.

From almost the opening of the protest meeting in Carpenters Hall, the high school girl was one of the leaders in an effort to turn it into what was termed a "real demonstration." Repeatedly she was snatched by Anton Johansson, business agent of the carpenters' district council, who sought to keep the meetings within bounds of a legitimate protest.

"Only a Kid"

Then after the meeting was terminated, Miss d'Angelo and a group began shouting for a parade.

"I'm only a kid," she yelled from the top of an automobile, "but I guess I've followed these meetings long enough to know

Tussock Moth Is Active; Arsenate Of Lead Is Used

WASHINGTON (AP)—Injuries to apples, pears and other deciduous fruits, a second brood of the white-marked tussock moth makes its appearance this month.

A good spraying with lead arsenate, the American Nature association advises, will be of vast benefit in controlling the caterpillars. Additional measures include scraping off and burning the egg masses and removing that will be found clustered to buildings, tree trunks and other prominent places.

The tussock moth is one of the worst shade-tree pests. Under favorable conditions it is capable of increasing to enormous numbers, and its caterpillars may completely defoliate the shade and park trees of a community. Excepting conifers, it attacks almost every variety of tree, especially poplar, aspen, maple, elm, alder, birch and willow.

low. It has been known to do considerable damage to orchards by eating holes in green fruit.

Tussock caterpillars remain as caterpillars from a month to two weeks. When full grown, they spin delicate, grayish cocoons of silk, mixed with hairs from their bodies, and within these cocoons they transform to pupae, and, about two weeks later, these change into moths of which the females are wingless. The males have well-developed, white-marked wings of grayish hue. Egg clusters, containing from one to several hundred, are protected with a white, frothlike substance.

About an inch and a half long, the full grown caterpillar is striking in appearance. Four white, brushlike tufts of hair—two on each side—stand upright in a row on the back. A pair of long black plumes protrude over the hind end of the body.

Shorter, yellow hairs are scattered over the creature, while a broad, black band, bordered with yellow, extends the full length of the back. The head is red, and there are red spots behind the tufts on the back.

An irritating skin rash, caused by small, barbed hairs shed by the caterpillar, may appear on the bodies of anyone upon whom it has fallen.
