VON ELM FACES MANY ASPIRANTS

Bobby Jones and Jimmy Johnson Among Those He Will Meet

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—The rolling and rugged greens of the Minkahda club here George Von Elm of Los Angeles will defend his title of national amateur golf champion of the week of Aug. 22.

Von Elm will shoot at the semi-final mark made in the semi-finals on the same course in 1912. Chick Evans set a record of 28 for the open championship at Minkahda, never equaled in the United States and only recently bettered by Bobby Jones by one stroke to the British open at St. Andrews.

Minkahda offers a course minus rough holes and blind greens and with putting greens developed nearly to perfection. A hardy of surface, including Bobby himself, will try to lift Von Elm's crown.

Amidst the golfing layout is a back drop of twinkling lakes, forested terraces and clumps of brilliant verdure that lend natural beautification to the stretches of ominous bunkers and tricky water holes.

Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnson will carry the hopes of the home club, Johnson, a Minkahda member, has smashed out a noteworthy record in competitive golf. His

most recent exploit was leading the field for 26 holes with 144 strokes in the national open at the Oakland club. Later he won the Minnesota amateur title for the seventh consecutive time. He was twice a holder of the Walker cup, team and western amateur champion, in 1924.

Donald Garrick of Toronto, Canadian amateur champion, probably will be the only foreign opponent.

The Minkahda club has improved its links and added 300 yards and numerous hazards to make expert shots imperative at all points. It is one of the few courses that has its fairways watered throughout.

The links ran 5,669 yards, with the front nine totaling 3,125 yards and the second 2,544 yards.

Par for the out trip is 35, so though the second hole, 444 yards, takes only two holes of the normal distance for par 5, and the seventh 415 yards, is ten yards more than the usual par 4 limit, so that most cards would make it par 35.

The second nine has a 37 par, but the tenth and sixteenth holes are only 25 yards short of par length.

While the halves are uneven by 400 yards and two par strokes, difficulties are about evenly divided and a score of par 72 is excellent golf.
