

SACCO OKEH, IS WARDEN'S WORD

Denies Story that Con-
demned Man Collapsed
at Prison Yesterday

BORTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—Warden William Hendry, of the state prison, took occasion today to say emphatically that Nicola Sacco, who started the 27th day of his hunger strike by refusing his breakfast, was not in a state of collapse. It was explained at the prison that so long as Sacco was able to walk the prison physician,

Dr. Joseph McLaughlin, would not consider attempting forcible feeding.

Bartolomeo Vanzetti, who with Sacco is awaiting the outcome of the last legal moves by their counsel to prevent their execution, now set for the early morning of August 23, broke his intermittent fast after he received word of his latest reprieve. Under the physician's advice he is gradually working back toward a normal diet and this morning he had some beef tea and bread with his coffee.

Denies Collapse

"Sacco is not in a state of collapse," said Warden Hendry. "He did not collapse yesterday at any time. He walked alone from the death house to the prison proper and up the stairs to the second tier of cells in the Cherry Hill

section. When he arrived he sat down on his cot.

"Later he walked from the cell to the barber shop where he had a conference with one of his counsel. He walked back to the cell unassisted by any official and he did not collapse afterwards."

Dr. McLaughlin on his morning visit found Vanzetti asleep and Sacco writing. Sacco rose and came to the door of the cell where he remained in conversation with the physician for five minutes. He said Sacco stood without apparent effort.

To Meet Tuesday

The full bench of the supreme court, or as much of it as available, has been summoned to meet next Tuesday morning to hear arguments by defense counsel on the last two lines of legal recourse

left open to them in the state courts.

The way to both of these was paved yesterday when Judge Webster Thayer, superior court judge who presided at the original trial, and Justice George A. Henderson of the supreme court, consented to allow appeals from previous adverse rulings.

POLICE ORDER NOTICES POSTED FOR PEDESTRIANS

PARIS (AP)—The right of the pedestrian to cross the street has been further recognized in Paris. The recently appointed prefect of police, M. Chiappe, has ordered 450 more notices for placement at the most dangerous crossings. The notices indicate where pedestrians may most safely venture.

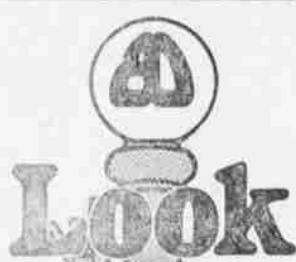
EMPLOYER PREFERS DIRTY-FACED BOYS

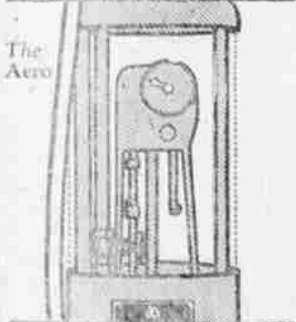
