Harold Lloyd's "Haunted Spooks" At The Star

Popular demand has brought about the re-issue of the Harold Lloyd two-reel comedy, "Haunted Spooks," which will be featured in the program Saturday only at the Star Theater.

This was one of the famous \$100,000 comedies brought out some years ago and which elevated Lloyd from relative obscurity to the position of the greatest comedian that the screen has ever known.

As will be remembered, Mildred Davis now his wife, was Lloyd's leading lady in those days, and helped materially in making the earlier Lloyd films of fun popular. Picture-goers will welcome this opportunity of seeing once again the charming Mildred.

At the time of its release, critics hailed "Haunted Spooks" as one of the funniest comedies that Lloyd ever turned out, and today it is accepted as a fact that this hilarious farce was greatly instrumental in making the un-spectacular comedian to the fore.

That it is a dramatic story, full of tense and gripping action plus acting of the highest quality, is the first thought that enters the mind of the reviewer. Then again the smoothness of the story, the simple but rich dressing of the sets, and the splendid photography, all combine in making "Lost at Sea" a picture worth while seeing.

Jane Novak as the leading woman far surpasses herself in her emotional scenes. She does not depict "motion picture" emotion, but there is a genuineness to her acting that brought its message from the screen to the audience.

Then there is a clever little lad, Billy Kent Schaefer, who had more than one man and woman in the audience fervently wiping a moist eye. Huntly Gordon, Lowell Sherman, Natalie Kingston, Joan Stander and William H. Walling were all excellent in their various roles.

The story tells of the complications that arise after the sinking of an ocean liner and the unexpected return of the husband who was reported drowned. It would be unwise to reveal the intensely interesting situation that presents itself, as it would take the edge from the surprise twist in the story.
