

EMMETT APPLES DRAW BIG PRICE

Contracted for \$40 to \$60
a Ton—Bumper
Crop Reported

EMMETT, Aug. 18.—(Ap) Apples are in great demand this season and many of the orchard crops of the Emmett district have been contracted for at from \$40 to \$60 per ton f.o.b. Emmett. Delicious and fancy apples are selling for as high as \$60 a ton.

The apple crop in the valley is the best that has been grown in several years, and owing to the shortage in other parts of the nation will be in great demand and prices received will compare favorably with other high years.

Any reasonably good apple will bring \$40 a ton this season. It is indicated, and some of the choicest quality and varieties will be sold for \$60 or better. Quality is unsurpassed in orchards of southern Idaho this year and growers are likely to receive a good profit for all they produce.

One report was that an embargo of the Ontario-Payette section had turned down an offer of \$3000 for the fruit in his 20 acre planting of Delicious apples, expecting to get more money.

1200-CARLOAD APPLE CROP. PHILLY, Aug. 18.—(Ap) Conservative estimates now place the apple production of the Fruitland branch at 1200 carloads, less of which will be lifted out from this station. The other 200 cars grown on the lower end of the branch will be loaded at Ingersoll station, 15 miles north of Fruitland and lifted out from Payette.

While the apple yield has, at times, been larger than the present season, the crop being one of the richest ever grown in this section—and the indication for a good price—may cause Fruitland to surpass the record shipment of 1375 cars in 1925.

AMERICAN ARTISTS HOLD OWN SALON

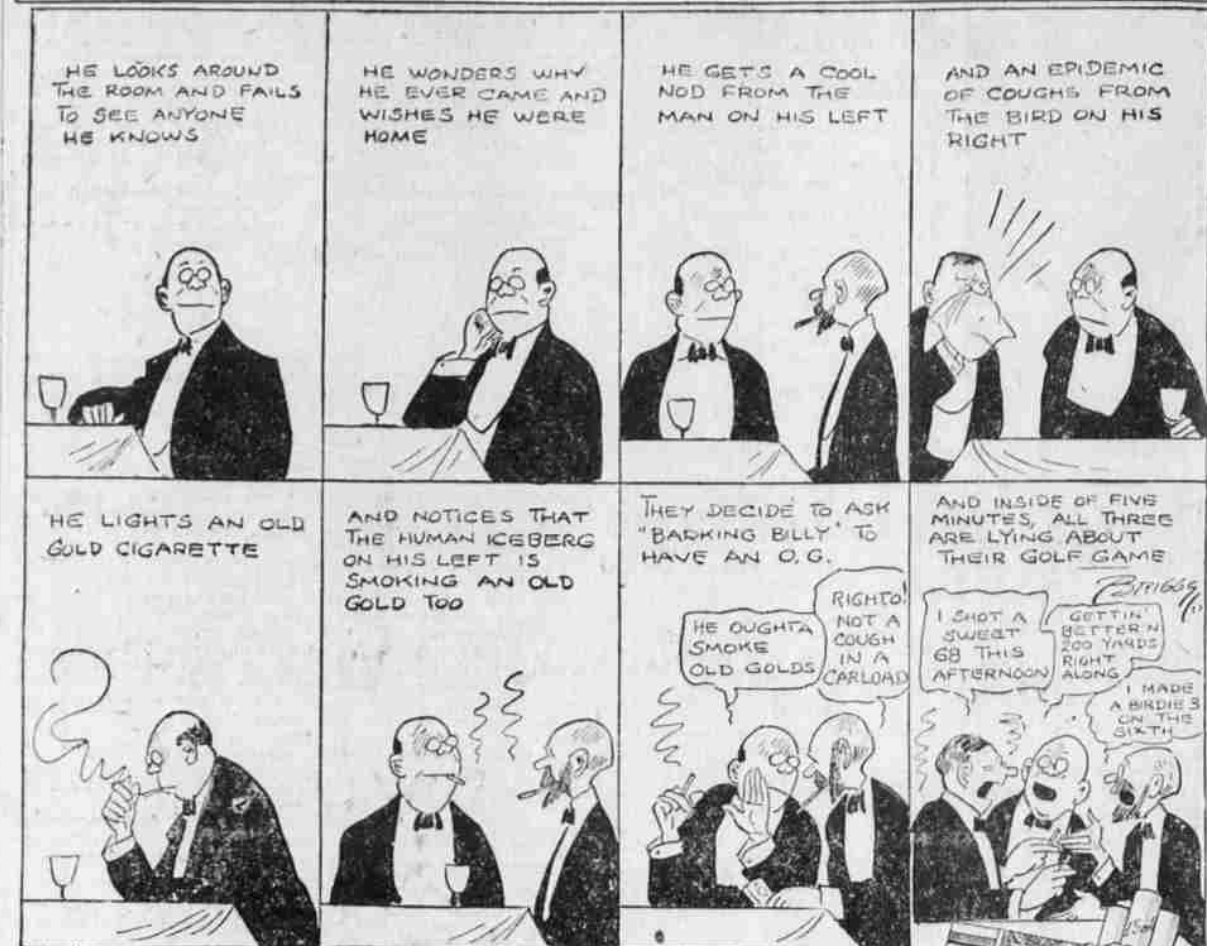
PARIS (Ap)—A cross section of the work of American artists in Paris was presented at the salon
