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## 4 MEN MISSING IN FOREST FIRE

Searchers Sent Out into Spirit Lake Region Near Longview

LONGVIEW, Wash., Aug. 19 (AP)—Four men of a crew fighting a forest fire at Green River, in the Spirit Lake region, were missing today, and searchers were sent out to seek them.

The men were with a party of 14 sent from the United States national forest a week ago, were believed to have taken a wrong trail. The men carried a week's food supply.

For mist and rain were aiding men in controlling the Green River fire today, and the fire was reported under control after having burned over about 600 acres. Forty forest service men and 25 or 30 state forest men were holding the blaze in check.

The Slousson fire was reported to have jumped two miles in the past two days. Deputy supervisor Harry White of the Columbia national forest and other officers are directing the fight against the Slousson fire.

Incendiaries were suspected of having set two fires in the Ostrander railway and timber company's slashings at Silver Lake this week. Both fires were under control today. Three hundred loggers and a few mill men have been fighting these fires. Light rain was aiding them today. The Ostrander mill right shift was off last night, due to log shortage because loggers have been fighting the fires. If the fire continued the day shift will have to close in two days. The mill employs 65 men.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP)—A storm area extending from Newfoundland to about 500 miles from the Irish coast together with adverse winds at Roosevelt field, Long Island, and a runway too soggy for a take off brought the official announcement that the Old Glory will not take off today on its projected non-stop flight to Rome with Pilots J. D. Hill and Lloyd Bertand.
