U. S. 'HANGMEN' GIVEN WARNING

Socialist Deputy Hints at Reprisals If Sacco and Vanzetti Die

PARIS, Aug. 20 (AP)—A warning to "the American hangmen" that if Sacco and Vanzetti are executed "they will have to fear legitimate reprisals by an exasperated proletariat" is given by the Socialist Deputy Vallant-Goutier in an article in L'Humanite today. "Let the fascists and American Legion accomplices take notice," he says. Knaphausing that Sacco and Vanzetti are "victims of class hatred," he declares that the proletariat which by its action has already stayed the hand of the executioner, can yet prevent the irrevocable, if they express themselves with sufficient vigor. Therefore he invites all workers to attend 20 meetings organized by the communists in Paris and the Paris district tonight.

New York's Force of Police on Duty
NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—New York's entire force of 14,000 policemen ordered out when word reached here of the Massachusetts supreme court's decision adverse to Sacco and Vanzetti, were back on emergency duty today for their vigil against possible disorder.
