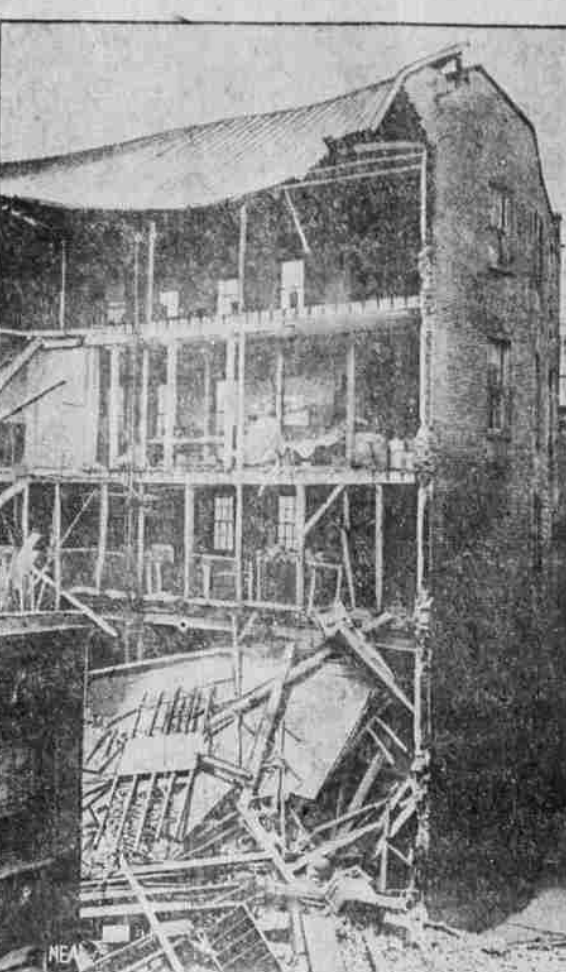

## BELIEVES HE SAW PLUNGING PLANE

Commander of Destroyer Describes Light Dropping Through Clouds

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22 (AP)—Captain E. H. Cornors, commander of the destroyer Hazelwood, which was patrolling the Honolulu route 325 miles off the Golden Gate Friday night, believes he saw the Dallas Spirit falling downward in the tall spin which is thought to have ended the lives of its pilot, William P. Ewin, and its navigator, A. L. Echevalde.

A light dropping through the thin clouds is believed by Captain Cornors to have been a wing of Ewin's plane, although its probable significance he did not realize until the navy's radio station notified him of the aircraft's despairing call for help.

The Hazelwood, which was stationed 100 miles off the shore at the beginning of the Dale flight, was searching the waters west of that position for the two missing contestants, the Miss Doran and the Golden Eagle, when the Dallas Spirit passed over him.

Information from the shore that Captain Ewin's craft was believed to have fallen into the ocean and the approximate position, he headed directly for it and reached there within four hours. Over an area of 40 miles square the Hazelwood zigzagged, several times sighting logs and other floating objects, each time to be disappointed on approach.

The aircraft Langley with its crew of observation planes was today steaming over the vicinity searched by the Hazelwood, which was forced to abandon the search to refuel. The Hazelwood arrived here this morning.

## Fires Spreading In Washington's Forested Area

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22 (AP)—Forest fires burning in Skamania county Washington, were reported today to have reached Silver Star mountain, near the Clark county line. The fires had been driven by an east wind which shifted to the west.

Three days of increased humidity aided crews fighting the fires in the Columbia national forest where the flames were in great danger, but the atmospheric change had little effect in old burned areas.

The Storm King fire, in the Olympics was still out of control today. The Quinault fire was checked yesterday afternoon. The Hama-Hama fire was controlled after having burned 110 acres.

Fifteen men were sent into the Columbia forest to replace fire fighters there.

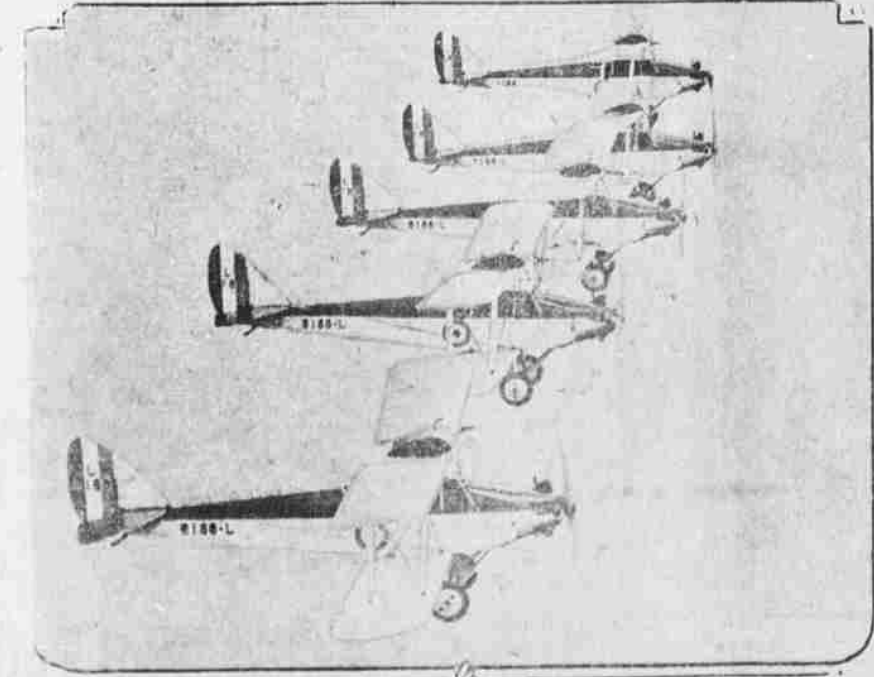
