Soon after their arrival at the lake, the men baited their hooks and cast in their lines. They waited patiently for an hour or more for results, and receiving not even a nibble, they left the shores of the lake and went into the woods where they cut down fir tree limbs.

Binding them together with pieces of barbed wire which they found there, the ingenious sportsmen, after several hours of hard labor, had completed a raft.

Al Simmons Has A Chance To Win Batting Laurels of Junior League

NEW YORK (AP)—It begins to look as if the American League may produce another champion batter out of its crop of right-handed clubbers this season. Al Simmons of the Athletics is the fellow in question.

Since 1906, when Larry Japp of the old Cleveland Naps topped the field, Harry Hellmann stands as the only right-handed batter to win the junior league batting crown. Hellmann led the pack in 1921, 1922 and 1923, gaining the title of "odd year king" by his extraordinary other-season success. Harry, accordingly, is due again this campaign, and has been gaining rapidly of late on the leaders after a poor start.

From 1904 to 1920, inclusive, left-handed batters ruled the American League roost. George Stone of the Browns started it, to be followed by Ty Cobb in 1907. Cobb stepped through nine consecutive campaigns as the counting year. In 1914, Tris Speaker, called the Cuban dynasty, but only for a single year.

Cobb came back in 1917, to regain his old laurels, turning the trick again the next two seasons. In 1920 and 1922, George Simek was the monarch and in 1923 Babe Ruth showed the way. Last season, Heinie Manush was champion. Simmons got off to a good start this season and has got close to the 400 mark right along. Injuries put him out of the game for a while during the latter part of July. His greatest rival appeared to be Lou Gehrig, the junior member of the home run firm of Ruth and Gehrig.

Should Simmons claim his way to the league's batting title, he will have given many of the experts a veritable haul on their predictive betters. For when Al broke in with the Athletics in 1924, he was the subject of much unfavorable comment because of one of baseball's most peculiar batting stances.

Simmons looked like anything but a batter at the plate. His stance was awkward, his left foot being placed so far on his right that it was as if he were leaning to be totally off-balance. All of which immediately earned Simmons the sobriquet of "foot-in-the-water-batter."

Simmons stepped out to give the spectators a show by hitting .403, a fair average for a 21-year-old youngster in his first major league season. The next campaign he collected 222 sacrifices, hit the 400 mark the year he batted .341.

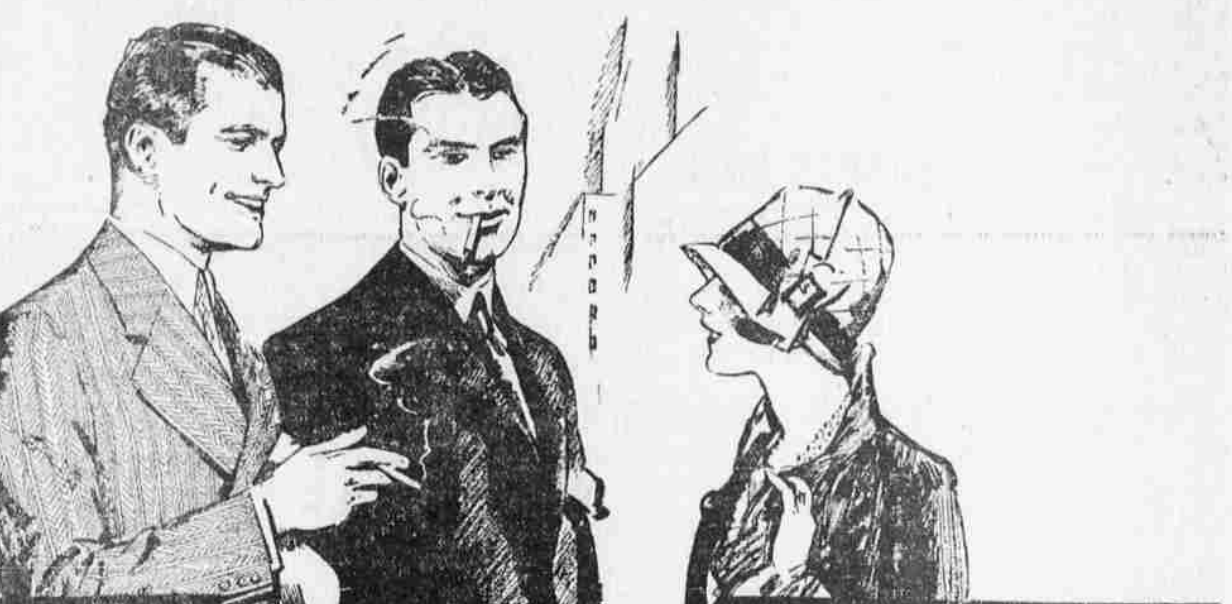
