ANDREW P. GREENER
COVE, Aug. 24 (Special)—The death of Andrew P. Greener at his home in Pine Valley at ten o'clock Wednesday morning marked the passing of one of the two Civil War veterans who have been residing in Pine Valley.
Mr. Greener was born in Illinois March 4, 1841, and at the beginning of the civil war enlisted in Co. B, 57th Illinois Infantry. He was a member of General Sherman's famous campaign through

the south to the west. After the war Mr. Greener moved to Kansas where he taught school. He moved to Oregon in 1875 settling first in the Grande Ronde valley and moving to Pine Valley in 1877, where he became engaged in farming and livestock. He was the first postmaster in the town of Halfway.
Mr. Greener was a member of Phil Keany Post of the G. A. R., and since 1908 has been affiliated with the Presbyterian church. He was married to Amanda Brooks in 1873 and five of their seven children survive. Three sons, Elmer, Ed and Norval and two daughters, Mrs. Olga Sturgis, of Pine Valley, and Mrs. Evelyn Barber, of Rureka, Cal., are the living children.
