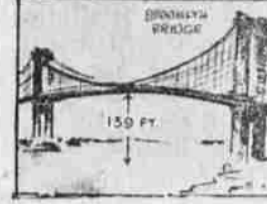

Farm Pointers

Mixing heat-damaged wheat with sound wheat is a poor practice. Only one percent of shell-burned wheat, or half of one percent of badly heat-damaged wheat will injure the milling and baking qualities when mixed with sound wheat. Wheat that is badly heat-damaged also is of inferior milling quality. It usually gives a soggy flour yield and the flour has a high ash content. Bread is discolored, has a bitter taste and a sticky crust.

Most egg producers do not realize that adjustment of feed conditions. More feed is needed as a rule, because of the loss of protein in the feed. The protein of the high-grade products are complete and can be utilized by the body for repair of waste and the building of new tissue, whereas the protein of the inferior products are in part incomplete and therefore not utilized by the body to the best advantage.

When skim milk is fed to calves other feeds are needed to supply the fat removed from the milk. A grain mixture, made of the grains usually found on the farm or in markets nearby, will serve as a

Good supplement to skim milk. Corn is high in carbohydrates and fat and largely lacks the protein of fat removed from the milk. Corn fed to calves should be crushed rather than finely ground. Wheat bran is very palatable and has an excellent effect. Ground oats are very good.

Clarence DeMar May Leave Record For All Time—Runs 7,500 Miles

MELROSE, Mass. (AP)—A marathon record that may endure for future generations is now in the making. Clarence DeMar, like the brook in the poem, "runs on forever."

Already DeMar's distance running record is unapproached by any other living athlete. Since he is running today as well as he ever did, observers predict that when he finally puts away his running shoes he will leave a record that will stand for all time.

DeMar has been running marathons more than 16 years. He has run approximately 7,500 miles in practice and competition—more than a quarter of the way around the world. In 26 great races he has won more than half his stakes. In the others he has usually finished high among the leaders.

This summer DeMar entered his 40th year. In spite of his slight and apparently frail physique he is still setting the pace for other marathons. He is national marathon champion for the second consecutive year. He is triumphed this year in two outstanding classics. Under a brooding sun that made racing conditions anything but favorable he won the annual American Marathon at Boston for the fifth time—a record in itself which sports writers predict may never again be approached.

DeMar followed up his Boston triumph over runners of international note by winning the Laurel, Md. marathon for the second consecutive year. This year, as in other seasons, he has competed in various lesser races and modified marathons.

DeMar has retained a real amateur. There are no "sales" for marathon runners, and he has declined to use his reputation to further his interests financially. He works daily in a printing shop and does his training morning and evening by running the distance between the shop and his home. When it was suggested that he go into showbusiness he wondered, naively, why anyone would want to see him on the stage, and if people weren't rather tired of hearing about him.

The annual track and field meet of the New England Association of the Amateur Athletic Union was held in Melrose in his honor this summer and the day set apart as "DeMar Day."
