TOP GRADE EGGS RECEIPTS GAIN

Scarcity Shows Signs of Loosening — Butter Continues Firm

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26 (AP)—The local scarcity of receipts of top grade eggs shows some signs of loosening. The volume of receipts from the country was a little improved yesterday and dealers at the late afternoon session of the dairy exchange were ready to bid extra down 2 cents to 3 1/2. The new exchange wholesale price today. Firsts are also down 1 cent to 2 1/2. Other grades are unchanged.

The butter market continues on a firm basis locally with no change in quotations for wholesale grades today.

Country dressed meats and poultry were quiet this morning. All kinds of meats were firm at steady prices. Light hogs were easy at 13c.

Lumber Industry Output Increases

NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—The softwood lumber industry of the country showed substantial increases in production and shipments for the week ended Aug. 20, while the order file fell off to some extent, compared with the week before, the National Lumber Manufacturers' association reports. Compared with a year ago, production was heavier, a marked decrease in shipments and new business about the same. Hardwood operations showed decreases in all three items over the previous week. Unfilled orders of 225 southern pine and west coast mills were 428,881,832 feet, against 619,219,297 feet for 226 mills the week before.

WOOL REPORT

U.S. Steel, Motors, General Electric Issues Go Higher

NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—Establishment of new high records by United States Steel common, General Motors and General Electric featured the mixed price movement in today's stock market. Spectacular bidding up of the pivotal industrials and a select assortment of specialties continued to monopolize speculative interest, although renewed weakness developed in the oil shares and some of the public utilities.

Publication of the pamphlet report of the General Motors corporation, showing a record-breaking earnings for the first six months, stimulated the demand for the stock, which advanced from the 250 level. The new stock crossed 125. Steel common advanced to a new peak at 111. Violent advances took place in several specialties. Vulcan Steel, which soared 20 points, the "A" stock 15. Commercial Solvents "A" 18 1/4 and S. H. Kress 15. Atchafalca sold down 2 points but Chesapeake and Ohio duplicated the record high of 194 and moderate gains were recorded by some of the other high priced carriers.

Three-Arrow preferred broke 4 points and Radio Corporation advanced 2. The closing was strong. Paddy boxing broke out on a large scale in United States Steel, General Motors and General Electric, all of which topped their previous high figures.
