OLD MISSION SHIP TO BE BROKEN UP

LONDON (AP)—"Gin and Bibber" as the sailors affectionately called the old sailing mission ship Harmony, is now in the graveyard of ships.

After a service of more than 50 years in the Arctic the 260-ton vessel has been sold by the Moravian Missionary Society, to be broken up.

The Harmony was the last of a succession of Harmony ships which sailed along the coast of the Arctic, carrying supplies since 1771.

A year ago the Harmony left Dartmouth for her last voyage to the trading stations of Labrador. For the last time the Eskimos came out, shot of guns, and made a carnival time of her arrival.
