

LOCAL BUSINESS COLLEGE ENTERS ITS THIRD YEAR

Inter-Mountain Commercial School Shows An Encouraging Growth

PRACTICAL WORK ATTRACTS SCORES

If Classes Continue to Increase May Alter Terms to Provide Best Supervision.

The fact that many new business institutions have been opened in La Grande during the past few years is proof of the all around growth of the city. Among other new institutions here is the Inter-Mountain Commercial college, which was opened two years ago Aug. 2 in the L. O. O. F. building and since then has made a steady growth.

Considerable work was necessary before the actual opening of the college and offices for the school were maintained here for about six weeks before the school started. Miss Edna Mae Matheson was the secretary in charge, and answered all questions made regarding the school and took enrollment until a sufficiently large class had enrolled to warrant the opening of the school itself.

H. L. Marsden, owner of the school, made his headquarters here a while previous to the opening. When the school was finally organized and ready to start Mrs. L. B. Betty came to La Grande and since then has been the principal and instructor.

124 Attend in Two Years
Although the enrollment is comparatively small at present, this always being the case during the summer months, it has been as high as 30 students at one time. The total enrollment since the opening of the school two years ago is 124.

The equipment in the school is equal to that of many of the larger business colleges, and is of the most modern type. There is a typewriter, a calculator, book-keeping machine and other necessary equipment.

Two rooms in the basement of the L. O. O. F. building on 32nd street are occupied by the school. One large room is used for the general school and class room, and the other room, which is smaller, is used as the typewriting room.

Business Curriculum
Everything which is taught in a modern business college is furnished at the school, complete, dual-annual courses being given. The

various types of courses make the length of time required to complete a course vary. The longest course probably being shorthand and typewriting, which requires an average of six or seven months depending largely on the adaptability of the student.

Students may enter the college at any time, there being no set time for the beginning and ending of a course. However, if the school enrollment increases very much it will be necessary to establish classes in short hand, and subjects of that kind, that will begin and end a course at a certain time. Now the instructor has sufficient time to give to every individual making this unnecessary.

Steady Growth
The school is now looking forward to its third year in La Grande, and is doing so with a feeling that the growth during the next year will be even greater than during the past 24 months.

Licensing More Women Drivers

BERLIN (AP)—German women are acquiring driver's licenses in increasing numbers. The Berlin police now issue permits to women at the rate of 120 per month. Before a license is granted to anyone, a rigorous examination is insisted upon. The candidate must show not only that he can drive a car, but that he is familiar with the motor and able to make repairs. He must also know the technical term for every part of his car.

The police say that their experience with women at the steering wheel has been uniformly satisfactory. Women, they say, are by nature inclined to be more cautious.

LONDON (AP)—Many bets were lost on the run of "Abie's Irish Rose" in London. After sixteen weeks the Anne Nichols play was forced to take the road because the more expensive seats in the house were chronically empty. Nichols was so confident that her play would duplicate its New York success in London that she engaged the company for 72 weeks and is now forced to send it into the provinces.

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Newspapers Deplore Airplane Marriages

BERLIN (AP)—The "Richshote," which bears the sub-title "Daily Organ for Evangelical Germany," and speaks for a large part of the country's Protestant population, calls airplane marriages "course nuisances."

The denunciation was called forth by the announcement of the double wedding in an airplane of two officials of the Reichsbach airplane works. This follows closely upon the recent first airplane marriage in Germany of Heinz Orbus, publicity chief of the Luftwaffe. The paper finds it "the limit of poor taste" for a pastor to don his official robe to perform the ceremony up in the air, and to permit the ringing on of an altar in the plane. It threatens "Should the report of this shocking event prove true, we shall expect the church authorities to take a hand and stop the nuisance."

The "Deutsche Tageszeitung," organ of the German Farmers' League, criticizes airplane marriages in a similar vein.

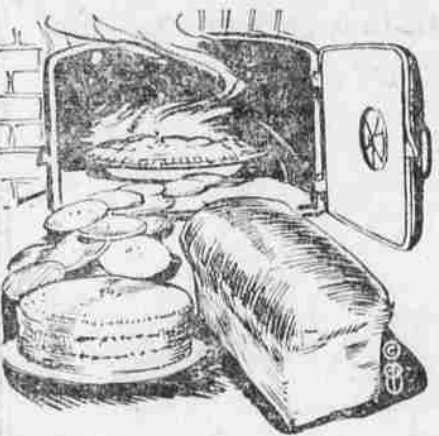
