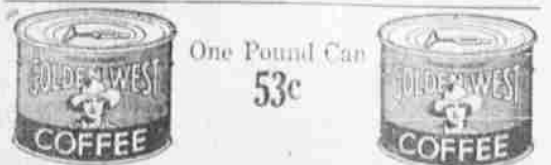

Jinx Seems To Follow Careers Of The Most Valuable Major Leaguers

NEW YORK (AP)—Like a medieval jinx, a major league receiving the most valuable player award usually seems to be followed by a jinx. Each at least, with very few exceptions, has been the case in the big circuits.

In 1922 George Sisler was voted the American league's best player. He hit .327 and also set a new record for two-base hits, getting 54. Along with Eddie Collins was one of the outstanding reasons why the Indians surprised the multitude by finishing second after the majority of the experts couldn't see them better than fifth.

This season, however, Burns is not Burns of a year ago. His hitting has slumped. He hasn't the old pep and aggressiveness that marked his efforts of 1925. In a recent game in the east George was yanked from the lineup.

It's been much the same in the National league. Old Man Jinx appears to be on the job.

Hornby's Case
Two years ago Rogers Hornby won the award. Last year a bad crop of both and managerial responsibilities put a crimp in the player's batting average, which fell to .26 points. Hornby, the greatest right-handed pitcher since the late days of Larry Doyle, and batting champion of the National league six straight campaigns, turned in a mark of 3.17.

Last fall Bob O'Farrell, Cardinals pitcher, won the player prize. But did a great deal to bring St. Louis its first pennant and world title. He was later made manager.

This year O'Farrell has been in the club's lineup only at various times. A lame arm handicapped him for the first few months of the campaign.

Two of these "most valuable players" haven't been hit quite so hard by the old jinx. They are Walter Johnson and Babe Ruth. Johnson won the honor in 1924. He won 28 games that year and just seven. He came back the following season with 20 victories and seven defeats. Last year, however, Walter won only 13, dropping to 15.

Yankee gained the National league award in 1924, 1926. He finished with 28 victories against 61 defeats. He finished 1927. The best campaign he turned in 22 wins to 10 losses, finishing 231. Last season, though, Yankee could cap his 3 games, while losing 10.

Pittsburg held its lead in the National league yesterday, Chicago going down by 4 to 3 as the Cardinals assumed the supremacy on an eyelash margin of a single percentage point.

Several days ago Wrigley's benchmen were counting along in front on a five and one-half game lead.

An open date kept the Cards and Giants from the heart-breaking struggle yesterday while rain washed out Brooklyn's fracas at Boston.

The Phils and Reds were without schedule.

The Giants were not two games from the coast and have back of them a winning streak of seven straight accumulated off western opposition.

The Tigers shook off the jinx tagging at their heels through eight straight games and subdued the Browns 5 to 4 and Cleveland topped the White Sox 8 to 5.

Rain caused postponement of other American league games.

Gene Tunney On Way To Chicago For Title Fight

SPECULATOR N. Y. (AP)—Gene Tunney said good-bye to his Adirondack village Thursday afternoon and started on his trip to Chicago, where he is to defend his heavyweight title against Jack Dempsey.

Leaving Speculator at 5:30 o'clock, Tunney drove to Utica with his entourage to catch the Twentieth Century limited at 7:25 o'clock, eastern standard time.

There was no training on Gene's program Thursday, and he spent the time packing and saying farewell to his friends. It seemed as if everybody in the settlement natives and summer boarders as well, wanted to shake the champion's hand and wish him luck on the night of the 22nd.

An impromptu dinner at the Osborne inn closed Tunney's visit to Speculator. Matthew Brown, cook of the hotel, and Bill Osborne, the proprietor, put their heads together and decided that Gene should win by a knockout in the fourth round, so Brown baked a cake and Osborne decked it with four candles, one for each round. After dinner the cake was cut and everybody had a piece.

In the champion's party were his three opening partners, Chick Wiggins, Billy Vidaleck and Frank Miskle, and a few newspapermen. Lew Pink, Tunney's trainer, went to Utica ahead of the motorcade, but planned to join his charge at the railroad station.

CHICAGO, Sept. 2 (AP)—The mayor, the city council, the American Legion and civic leaders were banded together today into an official welcoming committee for Gene Tunney, the world's heavyweight champion.

There was on the program a parade from the hotel station to the city hall, to give Chicagoans a chance to glimpse the man who is to defend his title against Jack Dempsey at Soldiers Field September 22.

Some key-to-the-city ceremonies at the city hall were arranged, to take only a short time. Then Tunney was to look over the city and go to his training quarters at Cedar Crest country club. He has been training at Speculator, N. Y.

Tunney is a comparative stranger in Chicago. His only fight appearance here was four years ago when he won a decision over Jimmy Delaney in a semi-final.

Dempsey yesterday boxed three rounds with a trio of partners. He devoted his time to perfecting a defense against left hand leads and left jab, but he pleased the crowd of fans on hand when he occasionally let go with some of the punches he hopes to land on Tunney.

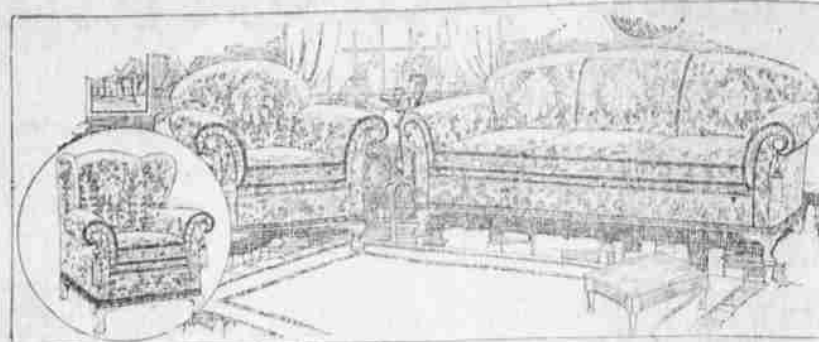
Fans are paying \$1.10 each to watch Dempsey train, but Tunney has said the public can watch him free. He will find his camp at Cedar Crest similar to his camp in Speculator, except for isolation and elevation.

With the champion training here, tight ticket headquarters expect an increase in demand for tickets. However, the public already has paid out almost \$1.5 million in the advance sale, and Tex Rickard, the promoter, has reaffirmed his belief that the fight easily will attract a \$2,000,000 mob.

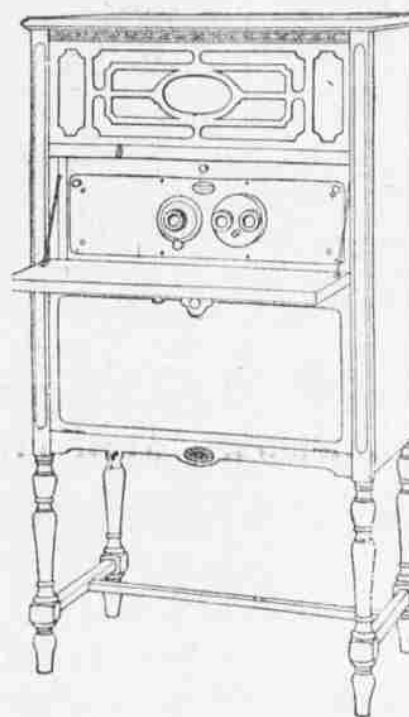
