PARISIAN WOMEN PLAN GALA DAY

Hostesses Making Arrangements To Entertain Legion 'Femmes'

PARIS (AP)—Being hostesses to several thousand Parisians may seem a formidable task, but it does not seem to be in charge of the reception to the women of the American Legion convention in Paris.

Mrs. Arthur W. Kipling, president of the Auxiliary Unit of Paris Post No. 1, will be a hostess to 6,000 guests when the convention is in full swing. She does not expect, however, to be any busier than the average hostess with a big and important party on her hands. Her pulse, she admits, is possible because she has been preparing for the 6,000 visitors for more than a year.

Furthermore, she has been assisted by a group of women who are members of the Women's Auxiliary of the Legion. For weeks before the opening of the convention Mrs. Lucy Boyd, national secretary of the Women's Auxiliary, has been operating an information and organization headquarters at the Hotel Continental, French and American staffs there worked day after day perfecting details of the women's five day convention program.

Mrs. Boyd, who comes from Indianapolis, Ind., and Mrs. Kipling, who comes from Chicago, Ill., will be in charge of the convention program. It will begin Sunday, September 13, with an All-Union breakfast, and end Thursday, September 22, with a banquet of Association secretaries. The formal opening of the Auxiliary sessions will be held Monday September 19. Tuesday the women will meet with the Legion in a joint convention at the Trocadero. The following day will be given over to reports and election of officers. The week-end is to be devoted to dedication ceremonies, sight-seeing and shopping by the Legion women.

The Paris chief hostess to the Legion is an American by marriage, only. She was born in Ireland and did not visit the United States until after her marriage to Dr. Kipling, an American resident in Paris for many years.

Few French women have more distinguished war records than Mrs. Kipling's. She is entitled to wear, and possesses, the 1914-1918 Star from the British Government, the Palm of the French Academy, the French Medal of Gratitude and Volunteers Medal as well as the white ribbon with gold palms for nursing for France. She was one of the five women who organized the American Ambulance at the Yverdon Red Cross in 1914. She immediately prepared herself for auxiliary nursing and was soon working with a volunteer motor ambulance service, organized by her husband and attached to French and British armies at the front. When the United States entered the war she was one of the highly trained cautions and literary workers for the Red Cross and one of the last officers they mustered out of their service in France.

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WEATHER HOLDS UP HARVESTERS
Hail Causes Some Loss In Wheat Fields; Seeding Conditions Good

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—Weather conditions in this county during the past few days have been quite favorable for harvest work. A number of heavy showers of rain fell during the early part of the week, and in some sections some hail fell which did a large damage to grain crops which happened to be in the path of the storm. The heaviest loss reported came from the hill sections east of here, where a field of 200 acres of winter wheat which had been cut yet was struck by the storm. This was on the Fred Hoar farm. Mr. Hoar, early in the week estimated the loss at around 2,000 bushels. Other crops over the country were more or less damaged from being knocked down by the wind and rain, although the greater part of the grain knocked down was confined to the irrigated areas where but a small amount of the grain has been cut. H. B. Oliver, of Lower Valley, has a field of 40 acres of heavy oats which were somewhat damaged by a hail storm. The first of the week, and the same field was hit by a heavy rain later in the week, laying the most of the field flat, which will make cutting very difficult.

Stationary threshing outfits and combines have practically all been laid off during the past two days waiting for the grain to become dry enough for threshing again.

Much of the second cutting of alfalfa in the valley was in the shock and has been quite wet, and will require several days sun to dry sufficiently to allow placing in the stack. The second cutting on many of the fields are not as heavy as the first, however, a good tonnage of hay is being taken from the most of them.

Seeding Conditions Good
The recent moisture has soaked well in the soil in the summer-fallow fields, which will make conditions excellent for fall seeding a considerable amount of which is being done at this time. A few farmers commenced seeding a week or ten days ago, and on some of these fields the grain is beginning to come up.

There remains a large amount of threshing to be done yet, but with several stationary outfits together with many combines used in this end of the valley, ten days or two weeks good weather will see the greater part of the crops taken care of.
