AT THE THEATERS

Adolphe Menjou At Star In Farce Comedy

See Adolphe Menjou in "Service for Ladies," which opened yesterday at the Star theater and which will be shown for the last time today. You won't be disappointed. Menjou declared that he considered this picture the best thing he has ever done. He is right. It is one of the finest Menjou vehicles that has come to La Grande in a long time, nor does that except "Reverend Mother," "Sorrows of Silenus" or even that colorful earlier story, "The Grand Duchess" and the "Walters" interesting as those productions were.

An actor of fact, Menjou can always be depended upon to give us good entertainment. Perhaps this is attributed to the fact that he always encounters no do stories with which he is wholly in sympathy. That this is true with regard to his present role as Albert, the hotel waiter at an exclusive Parisian hotel, is evident by the effectiveness of his characterization, one marked by an apparent absence of any attempt to act the part. Menjou seems to fit into the role with complete naturalness.

And this same psychology seems to apply to the case of all the cast. Kathryn Harvey, who we understand, makes her first appearance as a leading woman in this production, is simply and naturally herself. So with Lawrence Grant in the role of King Boris. Grant seems to fit into a titled role as though born to the part.

Photography is unusually effective throughout the production but especially in the show scenes of the Swiss Alps. These, the most colorful we have seen in a long time, are rivaled only by the brilliancy of the less colorful in which Menjou is seen as a fur-cloaked comical.

John Gilbert and Renee Adoree, that remarkable duo of "The Big Parade," play together again in the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer feature—told this time in Budapest rather than France. It is a strange romance of a strange underworld, told in a setting of uncanny mystery.

It depicts, astounds and mystifies—and a remarkable human interest story in the end overbalances its thrills. It is a story never to be forgotten—and because of the strangeness of its settings, strange as these are—but because of the wonderful romance that underlies them.
