THE CAMPAIGN AGAINST PREVENTABLE DISEASE

Seven hundred and fifty thousand lives are lost annually in the United States alone and \$4,500,000,000 in the financial loss in sick bills, reduced earning power, and premature death from preventable disease, to say nothing about the suffering caused. We stand appalled at these staggering figures. In the presence of such statistics, to have an intensive campaign instituted by the Gorgas Memorial against the known preventable diseases, and a drive inaugurated to ascertain the cause of the unknown ones by physicians, dentists and laymen of national reputation is always logical. Such men are to invent life and where they will bring greatest returns. They have made it possible to carry on experimental work which has practically obliterated many of the dreaded and dangerous diseases and rendered insignificant others which were once fatal.

It is the family doctor who is first called upon to alleviate suffering and stay the ravages of disease. It is he who appreciates most the results of the man who devotes into the untrammeled mystery of disease until the cause, prevention, and cure are discovered. He may have no laboratories, equipment or time for research work himself but acts as a channel through which the blessings of the investigator flows to suffering humanity.

He stands today with outstretched hand to the scientist for a leading light for tuberculosis, cancer, high blood pressure, and many other maladies before which he is utterly helpless. Shall we not come to his rescue and place at his command a remedial agent for every known disease?

There is a cause for every disease and to prevent its occurrence its cause must first be ascertained then its development and means of spread. We have discovered the cause of typhoid fever through laboratory investigation and also a means for preventing its spread, so far, no cure remedial agent to perfect a specific against the disease has been contracted. On the other hand we have not only discovered the cause of diphtheria, but a specific antidote for the disease.

The cause of tuberculosis has been ascertained but, unlike diphtheria and typhoid fever in that a means of inoculation has not been discovered to render one immune to its destructive action. Many such problems are yet unworked and the great leaders of medical thought are turning their attention to and investing their means in an endeavor to solve these problems. Soviet Justice

Gorgas is both timely and fitting; timely, because of the urgent need of more medical research institutions, equipment and workers to solve the great medical problems confronting the profession. Such a memorial is fitting and its ideal, in that it was there this great scientist and executor utilized his knowledge obtained in such institutions and stamped out yellow fever, making possible the construction of the Panama Canal, one of the world's greatest industrial accomplishments. This alone would entitle him to such recognition, but this is insignificant as compared with what was accomplished in alleviating this dreaded disease from Cuba and Panama and, in fact, made it possible to prevent its recurrence anywhere in the world.

Pastor Fills 13 Jobs In Month; Wins New Title

NEW MONMOUTH, N. J. (AP)—The world war brought out fighting persons galore, but to the Rev. H. Pierce Simpson goes the appellation of "laboring parson."

So that he might speak with authority when he came to deliver a sermon on "The Reward of My Brave" Rev. Mr. Simpson spent his vacation month this summer in manual toil.

The first intimation of his decision to his congregation in the First Baptist Church of New Monmouth was an advertisement in the church paper: "WANTED! WANTED! WANTED! A new job for every day. The pastor is spending his vacation working. Will spend a month getting a sermon for Labor Day. No choice of work, just so it is hard. No wages requested. Don't talk church matters."

His "job" was successful and his own parishioners gave him plenty to do. He was deckhand, fisherman, lobsterman, farm hand, clam digger, truck driver, mason, furniture man, coal heaver, furniture mover, carpenter and real estate agent.

In two weeks he had become brown and hardened to toil. He gained several pounds in weight and said he "felt fine."

Rev. Mr. Simpson recommends his idea to brother ministers—not only because it improved him physically and spiritually, but also because "it brought the pastor closer to the heart of his congregation."

Mr. Simpson is a graduate of the University of Virginia and of Princeton Theological Seminary.
