GENE TUNNEY IS  
TAKING IT EASY

Storing up Nervous Energy—Challenger Seeking More Speed

LAKEVILLE, Ill., Sept. 8. (UPI)—Now that Gene Tunney must be careful in his boxing engagements for the next week or more because of his injured eye, he can devote his time to storing up nervous energy. One of the reasons for the heavyweight champion's lax attitude is the opportunity it gives him for absolute rest and quiet and restoration of his nerve supply.

With no boxing scheduled today, Tunney's quarters at the Cedar Crest country club held only the champion's reflex and a corner's guard of nervousness, even less than a dozen visitors managed to worm past the policeman about the club in the course of a day.

Despite the heat and excessive humidity, Tunney feels himself today within a few notches of his best physical condition. At 132 pounds, the title holder is carrying scarcely a pound of excess weight.

The cut in Gene's light eyelid, inflicted by Chuck Wiggins' head in a training bout Tuesday, probably will be healed sufficiently to allow resumption of glove work Friday.

DEMPSEY SEKS SPEED  
LINCOLN FIELD, CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 8. (UPI)—Four days of hard work with the gloves are ahead of Jack Dempsey, after a 48-hour layoff from all training. Only newspapermen will be admitted to these workouts starting today, manager Flynn has ruled. Some new sparring partners—light fast men—have been called upon, though their names have not been announced.

Dempsey said he weighed exactly 200 pounds, after his two-day rest, and never felt better. He hopes to shed about six pounds in the coming fortnight, to enter

the ring around 192 or 194.

There was a noticeable elation in the Dempsey camp over the accident which laid open a gash in Gene Tunney's eyebrow. Manager Flynn called it "a break in our favor," adding that "fighters should take advantage of all the breaks."

Dempsey made no comment on the "break" but there was a grin on his face, as he recalled the incident, the cuts around his own eyes a year ago in the last of the season.
