Among the hundreds who traveled long distances Sunday to see Colonel Lindbergh when he stopped at Boise were Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Barrie and Miss Grace Wells, of La Grande. They not only saw Lindbergh but listened to the address which he made at the state grounds during the afternoon program. They relate that the air hero is an charming and unaffected as the press pictures of him and declared that his address which he delivered without notes of any kind was a straightforward well-worded message in which he pleaded for improved aviation service. Colonel Lindbergh mentioned the Blue Mountain aviation lighting system and declared that it was a great aid to the air mail service. This made a real impression upon the Oregonians in attendance. Mr. and Mrs. Barrie declared. The thousands who attended the program were able to hear every word of the address, they said, because of 15 broadcast units which were in use at the grounds. Mr. and Mrs. Barrie and Miss Wells also saw Lindbergh's plane, the Spirit of St. Louis. The plane is silver colored, with the name in small lettering on one side. They declare that the plane, which is very small, is a strikingly beautiful machine.
